1st. Those condemned, or against whom legal proceedings are pending. 2nd. Foreign agents of the Confederacy. 3rd. Military officers above Brigadiers, Bonds 733

and Naval officers above Captain. 4th. Person's implicated in Lincoln's assasination.

The President has directed that late copies of his late proclamation be sent to all those who have taken an oath to support the Constitution, so that they may know officially what is required of them, according to that document.
