From Washington.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—Col. Gilbert, implicated in destroying an Arkansas printing office, was fined one thousand dollars and reduced to Captain, and taking rank at foot of the list.

The New York Times concludes an editorial with, "But we are inclined to think that the Northern States will not surrender their own rights quite so complacently as they have consented to the overthrow of those of the South."

Mansfield, President of the Vicksburg Packet Company, who has a contract for a semi-weekly mail between Vicksburg and New Orleans at twenty-five thousand dollars, with privilege of a tri-weekly at thirty thousand at the option Department. The foregoing contractors will be prosecuted for failures.

Twenty-four million and sixty-nine thousand dollars even interest is due and payable on the first of November.
The revenue to-day is two hundred and seventy-two thousand.
James W. Hancock has been appointed Collector of Customs at St. Laria, Texas, vice Charles Taylor, deceased.
Senator Nye will stump New York in behalf of the Radicals.

The inquest evidence over the victims of the riot at Springfield, Massachusetts, shows that the State constables fired into the crowd after the riot had been subdued.
Six hundred Brooklyn new shopkeepers have been reported for violation of the revenue laws.
Revenue decisions: When a deed is made for real estate sold for taxes after the time of redemption is past, it must contain a recital of the facts, and the form must be in accordance with the laws of the State in which the real estate is situated, on the subject of sales under execution. Sugar cane is a farm product, but sugar is not. A person who manufactures sugar to an amount exceeding one thousand dollars per annum, pays a special tax, though the sugar be made on his own farm.

A dispatch from Vicksburg says there has been no deaths for the past forty-eight hours. The President has not ordered or requested the attendance of district commanders here.
The picture of two children feeding a horse held at the dead letter office, was claimed to day. The Portraits are of two deceased children. The claimants say that the loss of the picture was more deeply felt than all of their property swept away by the war. The claimants reside at Columbia, S. C. Mr. Zevely, third assistant Post Master General, at whose instance the notice was telegraphed, will restore the picture at once.

From Charleston.
CHARLESTON, S. C., Oct. 16.—Sailed—Steamer Prometheus, for New York.
Judge Bryan, of the U. S. Court, in a case to day testing the validity of the panel of a Jury, drawn of voters of tax payers, irrespective of color; decided that although the act of Congress in 1840 required the Jurors to be drawn as prescribed by the Legislature of each respective State, yet that this must be construed in reference to the changes created by the war; he held that Congress, as now constituted, was the legal Congress of the whole country; that the Reconstruction act of Congress conferring suffrage on the negro, was the provisional Constitution and law of the State; he held that President Johnson had no power to restore any seceding States to the Union. He says:
I say it with grave sense of responsibility that it was not competent for the President by any act of his to bend Congress and restore the State to the Union and connect it with it by Constitutional ligaments and relations. He held that there was no legal Government or State Constitution in South Carolina, and that to render the existing provisional government the reconstruction acts of Congress were the supreme law and the Constitution of the State. He says if there was any Constitution in South Carolina, or any legal State government then the act of 1840, commanding the Judge to accept as jurors alone those who are voters under the Constitution of the State and who are qualified by the act of its Legislature, then it would be decisive of this question and the panel should have been drawn alone white men, but it is otherwise.

Cable Summary.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—Great activity prevails in Toulon and at the Naval Arsenal.
Garibaldi has issued another address, urging the Italian nation to arm themselves. Mazini has issued a manifesto urging the patriots of Rome to rise and proclaim the Republic. If pressed he hopes they will take refuge in Baravia.
Skirmishing in the Papal Territory continues. Reports are conflicting, both sides claiming advantages. No very important conflicts have occurred at Menotti.
Garibaldi drove the Papal troops into Monte Maggiore. The Garibaldians who took the road to Mento to liberate the prisoners, were driven away.
BALTIMORE, Oct. 16.—Chase has delivered a decision releasing colored apprentices held under State laws.

From Richmond.

RICHMOND, Oct. 16.—Nominations of Marmaduke Johnson, N. A. Stardevant, William Taylor, Thomas J. Evans, and A. H. Sands, gives satisfaction to the Conservatives. The ticket of the moderate Republicans, with Dr. Sharp, brother-in-law of Gen. Grant, at the head, and Fields Cook, a mulatto preacher, at the tail, also meets with favor, but the conservative ticket spoils its effect. It is thought that the best men from both tickets may be taken to make a compromise. The ladies of the Oakwood Memorial Association are holding a bazaar to raise funds for the graves of the Confederate dead in that cemetery, and are being very successful.

Foreign News.

LONDON, Oct. 16.—Wild rumors of the Fenians planning an attempt to seize the Queen at Balmoral. The household guard have been doubled.
FLORENCE, Oct. 16.—The Papal troops are falling back on Rome.
PARIS, Oct. 16.—It is reported that Spain has tendered Napoleon assistance in sustaining temporal power over the Pope. Napoleon and Eugenie arrived at St. Cloud to-day.

From New Orleans.

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 16.—Special Orders No. 162 removes the Sheriff and Clerk of the 4th Judicial District Court, parish of St. Landry, for being obstacles to reconstruction; and appoints others to fill their vacancies.
The same order removes the Council of the city of Jefferson for passing an ordinance for the election of city officers in violation of special orders No. 7, current series.
Only twenty-eight deaths from yellow fever to-day. At the present rate of decrease it will soon cease to be epidemic.

MASS MEETING.—A grand mass meeting was held last evening, at Camp Lamb, and great enthusiasm prevailed. G. P. Rourke occupied the chair. Speeches were delivered by Gen. J. C. Abbott, S. S. Ashley, G. W. Price, Jr., G. Z. French, A. H. Galloway, Geo. L. Mabson, and Jas. Schienck, Jr.
The resolutions adopted will be published to-morrow.

The close vote in Pennsylvania and Ohio made the result of the election in those two States for some days a matter of doubt. The question is now pretty definitely settled, however, and we can determine pretty nearly the majorities of the successful candidates. In Pennsylvania official returns from all but two counties show Sharswood's majority to be 892, while the Legislature stands as follows: Senate—Republicans, 20; Democrats, 18. House—Republicans, 34; Democrats, 46. Republican majority on joint ballot, 15. In Ohio all doubt of General Hayes' election has vanished, and his majority continues to grow as the returns come in. It is pretty certain that it will considerably exceed three thousand. The strength of the Republicans lies in the rural districts rather than in the towns and cities, and hence the most favorable returns are the last to come in. At first it appeared as if Thurman was elected; and still later, as the returns from the rural districts came in, it began to appear that General Hayes had quite a handsome little majority. The Democrats, however, secure the Legislature and the next United States Senator.

As we surmised some days ago, Indiana turning out to be all right. In ten counties bordering on the Ohio river the Republicans have gained about fifteen hundred. The counties along the northern border, on the other hand, show a falling off in the Republican vote, but the Indianapolis Journal of yesterday claims that the full returns will show in the aggregate a decided Republican gain.
A final analysis of the vote will probably show that scarcely any voter who has heretofore voted the Republican ticket went with the Democrats this year.
