**UPHILL WORK.**—So far as heard from five persons only have joined the bogus Republican party of this State.

Every Republican paper in the State sustains the action of the Republican State Convention held in Raleigh on the 5th of September, 1867.

We wish to call particular attention to the resolutions in another column, offered in the Convention by Mr. GALLOWAY. No colored man in this State has been more traduced; no man has acted more honorably. Read them.

GENTLEMEN may honestly exult over the Republican losses in the recent elections; but it is blind infatuation. You are biting a file. The Republican party to-day is larger numerically than in 1864. The Presidential election will confirm this statement. Every sensible man believes it. Democrats do not like to acknowledge it however.

SINCE September 5th, 1867, the Obstructionist press throughout the South, and the Copperhead press North, has teemed with slanderous articles upon the colored people in this State. They have told their readers that the colored people were in favor of confiscation, and of taxing each and every acre of land in the State, one dollar for school purposes; that they were opposed to removing disabilities from disfranchised men, men loyal to the government. These charges have been scattered broadcast, when in fact there was little or no foundation for them.

On this point we publish to-day a series of resolutions adopted unanimously on Wednesday evening, by a meeting of the colored residents of this county, denying each and every allegation.

This meeting was the largest political gathering ever held in this county, and the resolutions therefore may be considered as expressing the views of the great majority of colored people.

We hope to hear no more charges of the kind repeated.

**Commendable.** There is one thing for which the people of the South deserve great commendation, and that is, the facility with which they have arisen from four years of suffering and distress, and of a prostrated financial existence, to the full exigencies of the moment, and to a realization of the necessity of a continued active exertion in the future.

No sooner had the sound of the cannon died away, and their release from military service been proclaimed, than they arose from their past years of commercial inaction, and throwing aside the sword, grasped the long unused pen with an energy and ability that in our own city at least, has not yet waned. Scarcely had the last shot of the war been fired, when the commercial activity of the merchants of Wilmington was aroused. The iron horses which had lately toiled in the transportation of the armed hosts of war, now drew after them long trains of cars filled with the native products of the soil. A forest of masts was soon seen at the wharves where whilom naught could be found but the daring blockade runner; new goods—articles of food and raiment—filled the late empty shelves of the stores, and throughout the entire business quarters a new and active life had commenced.

And this state of affairs continued throughout the summer and fall of '65—as long as there was produce left in the country for shipment to the North. A season of quiet then ensued, to be changed to bustling activity in the early part of '66, and now in the fall of 1867, we can look back with a commendable feeling of pride in the results of late labors. The population of our city has been increased many fold; order and quiet have been established and maintained, factories and workshops have sprung up on every hand, and to-day, we can proudly assert the fact that for its size, our city has no superior in commercial importance in North America. Much of the present result is, it is true, owing to Northern enterprise, capital and skill, yet the business energy and commercial ability of the old merchants have contributed their share, and have been such as to challenge the unqualified admiration of the best business men of the country.

**County Convention—Nominations.** The Convention of New Hanover County, held for the purpose of nominating delegates for election to the State Constitutional Convention, assembled in this city yesterday morning. Most of the precincts and wards were fully represented.

The Committee was called to order by G. Z. FRENCH, Esq., Chairman of the County Committee.

A temporary organization was effected by appointing Mr. ANTHONY HOWE Chairman, and GEORGE W. PRICE, Jr., Secretary.

The Committee on Credentials reported 45 delegates in attendance.

The Committee on permanent organization, reported the following, as permanent officers of the Convention, who were unanimously elected, viz:

To ascertain the mind of the Convention as to candidates for nomination, an informal ballot was taken; after which, the following named gentlemen were duly nominated as delegates to the State Constitutional Convention, viz:

On motion of J. W. SCHENCK, Jr., the nomination was made unanimous by acclamation.

A committee of five was appointed by the chair, to nominate a County Committee of twenty-one persons, report to be made at the evening session.

The proceedings of this Convention were conducted with praiseworthy decorum and remarkable harmony.

With the Republicans of New Hanover County there is but one purpose and one effort, viz: To effect for North Carolina a political reconstruction, just and permanent; to abolish class legislation; to lighten the heavy burden of taxation which weighs so unequally upon the people of the State; and to open the avenues of education to all the people.

Justice in government, equality before the law, and fraternity in citizenship must prevail.

The city delegates to the County Committee were authorized to act as a City Committee.

The County Committee was empowered to fill whatever vacancies might occur in the body during the year.

The following resolutions were offered by Mr. A. H. GALLOWAY and unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, It has been stated in many of the leading conservative papers of this and other States, that Mr. A. H. GALLOWAY was in favor of taxing the land of this State one dollar per acre; and, Whereas, such sentiments were not offered in Convention, but in mass meeting, and at a time when the Delegates of the State Convention were not in session, and was not then, and is not now the opinion of Mr. GALLOWAY or of the wish of the Republican party; therefore

Resolved, That we believe that these accusations of the enemies of the Republic are unwarranted, unjust and utterly false.

Resolved, That we, the Republicans of New Hanover county, are in favor of equal and just taxation for the establishment in this State of a free school system, in order that we may secure education and happiness for our posterity.

We hope that the Conservative papers and orators will be as diligent in circulating the resolutions of Mr. GALLOWAY, as they were in giving currency to his alleged remark at Raleigh.

Mr. GALLOWAY is a true and earnest Republican. Justice to all men and wrong to no man is a broad plank in his platform. He makes war upon no class—he seeks to elevate all—we know that he will never be found advocating oppression.

A few items of unimportant business were transacted after which a few remarks were made by Mr. GALLOWAY, and the Convention adjourned sine die.

**Dr. Eugene Grissom.** Dr. Eugene Grissom is one of the gentlemen claimed by Mr. Goodloe in his efforts to disorganize and destroy the Republican party.

We felt sure, from our knowledge of this noble hearted patriot, that he was satisfied with the action of the late Republican State Convention, and that it was his fixed purpose to continue to act with the Republican party. The following letter from Dr. Grissom to Col. Dewees, in reply to a letter of the latter informing him of his appointment as a member of the State Committee, will show his position and views in this crisis:

NEW LIGHT, N. C., Oct. 10th, 1867.

MY DEAR SIR:—Your favors of the 5th and 8th inst., came to hand by yesterday's mail.

I am conscious of no word or deed by which my fidelity to Republican principles can be called in question. I should rejoice at an early reconstruction of the Union without confiscation in any form, and with the speedy restoration to the privileges of citizenship of all loyal men without regard to political antecedents. I am unable to find anything in the resolutions or platform of the late Republican Convention endorsing confiscation or further disfranchisement; and I cannot but regard a multiplicity of political issues as damaging to the prospects of an early re-union. I therefore declined the use of my name to a proposed Address to the people of North Carolina, written, I suppose, by Mr. Pool.

Give my compliments to Gov. Holden.—The personal and vindictive manner in which he is assailed by his opponents, will endear him the more to all far-minded and liberal persons.
