

The leaves of the trees were silent, and nature seemed sleeping amid all the beautiful rays of a solar spectrum. Still deep in this, nestled malaria-a serpent in the weeds-only needing a slight breeze from the West to reach the spot where we stood; to tincture the skin with an icteroid hue; to congest the liver, the spleen, and to bloat the symetry of man's body. The picture grew darker. It lost its sunshine, and lost its scenic grandeur. Every decade of years emigration poured in, the population increased, and Wilmington became a bustling thriving town. Five or six saw mills were in full operation in the year 1834; and, they had their depurative effect. It is, I think, an established fact that malaria is rendered less[®] noxious by the air of large cities. In 1830 Wilmington hardly numbered fifteen hundred human beings; to day it numbers between fitteen and sixteen thousand souls. What an increase ! When several decades of years will have passed down the stream of time we know that a rapid change will have taken place. The few fac tories of wood and other material will have increased a hundred fold. The streets now hardly traveled will echo to the tramp of men going to, and returning from their daily toil. The constant whistle of the steamer will indicate more activity, and the thousands of mechanic institutes, the hum drum of wheels and engines, will all, every one of

them, indicate a new era. As the fevers of 1831 were more malignant than those of York. 1867, so will those of 1890 be in a pro rato

No. 101. By the terms of the act of Congress entitled 'An Act to provide for the more efficient government of the rebel States," passed March 2d, 1867, and of the Acts of March 23d, and July 19th 1867, supplementary thereto —it is made the duty of the Commanding General of this Military District to cause a registration to be made of the male inhabitants of the State of North Carolina, of the age of twenty-one years and upwards and qualified by the terms of said Acts to vote, and after such registration is com-plete, to order an election to be held at which the registered voters of said State 'shall vote for or again-t a Convention, for the purpose of esor again-t a Convention, for the purpose of ea-tablishing a Constitution and civil government for the said State, loyal to the Union, and for delegates to said Convention,—and to give at least thirty days' notice of the time and place at which said e ection shall be held; and the said registration having been completed in the State of North Carolina. It is ordered: *First.* That an election be held in the State of North Carolina. commencing on Theoder.

North Carolina, commencing on Tuesday, the 19th day of November, 1×67, and ending on Wed-nesday, the 20th day of November, 1867, at which all registered voters of said State may vote "For a Convention," or "Against a Convention," and for delegates to constitute the Convention-in case a majority of the votes given on that quea-tion, shall be for a Convention, and in case a ma-

tion, shall be for a Convention, and in case a ma-jority of the registered voters shall have voted on the question of holding such Convention. Second. It shall be the duty of the Boards of Registration in North Carolina, commencing fourteen days prior to the election herein ordered, and giving reasonabl public notice of the time and place thereof, to revise for a period of five days the registration lists, and upon being satis-fied that any person not entitled thereto has been registered, to strike the name of such person A N Essay for Young Men on the Crime of solitude, and tue Diseases and Abuses registered, to strike the name of such person from the list; and such person shall not be en-titled to vote. In deciding who are to be stricken from or added to the registration lists, the Boards will be guided by the law of March 2d, 1867, and the laws supplementary thereto, and their attention is specially directed to the Supplementary Act of July 19th, 1867. Fourth. The said election will be held in each County or District at such places as may hereaf-ter be designated, under the superintendence of the Boards of Registration as provided by law, and n accordance with instructions hereafter to be given to said Boards in conformity with the Acts of Congress and as far as may be with the laws of North Carolina. Fifth. All judges and clerks employed in con-ducting said election, shall, before commencing to hold the same be swarm to the faither to hold the same, be sworn to the faithful per formance of their duties, and shall also take and subscribe the oath of office prescribed by law for officers of the United States. officers of the United States. Sizth. The polls shall be opened at such voting places at eight o'clock in the forenoon, and closed at four o'clock in the afternoon of each day, and shall be kept open during these hours without in ermission or adjournment. Seventh No member of the Board of Registra-tion, who is a candidate for election as a dele-gate to the Convention, shall serve as a judge of the election in any County or District which he seeks to represent. seeks to represent. <u>Lighth.</u> The sheriff and other peace officers of each County are required to be present during the whole time that the polls are kept open, and until the election is completed; and will be made responsible that there shall be no interference responsible that there shall be no interf-rence with judges of elections, or other interruption of good order. If there should be more than one polling place in any County, the Sheriff of the County is empowered and directed to make such assignments of his deputies, and other peace offi-cers, to the other polling places, as may, in his judgment, best subserve the purposes of quiet and order; and he is further required to report these arrangements in advance to the Command-er of the Military Post in which his County is aituated. situated. Ninth. Violence, or threats of violence, or of Abuth. Violence, or threads of violence, or of discharge from employment, or other oppressive means to prevent any person from registering, or exercising his right of voting, is positively prohibited, and any such attempts will be re-ported by the registrars or judges of elections to the Post Commander, and will cause the arrest and trial of the offenders by military authority.
