## Heavy Storm on the Rio Grande.

NEW ORLEANS, Oct 28.—The Picayuna has later advices which confirm the destructive effects of the late storm upon the Rio Grande. It was the most terrible of the memory of man on this frontier. Twentysix persons were killed at Mattamoras; Ten killed and 21 wounded at Brownsville and Brazos, so far as known. Twelve persons perished on the schooners Etta and Cadosh. She was blown high ashore.

Only two houses are left at Clarksville and none at Bagdad. The loss of life at the latter place is not known. Ninety of the inhabitants escaped by going on board a vessel, which rode out the storm. The rest must have perished. The negro soldiers and their officers at Brazos are said to have

acted infamously. Fifteen houses in Matamoras were destroy ed, and a large number in Brownsville.

HEADQUARTERS 2D-MILITARY DISTRICT. CHARLESTON, S. C., Oct. 18, 1867. ENERAL ORDERS,

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No. 101. By the terms of the act of Congress entitled 1867, and of the Acts of March 23d, and July 19th, 1867, supplementary thereto,—it is made the duty of the Commanding General of this Military District to cause a registration to be made of the male inhabitants of the State of North Carolina, of the age of twenty-one years and upwards and qualified by the terms of said Acts to vote, and after such registration is com-plete, to order an election to be held at which the registered voters of said State shall vote for registration having been completed in the State of North Carolina. It is ordered :

First. That an election be held in the State of County North Carolina, commencing on Tuesday, the County 19th day of November, 1867, and ending on Wed-nesday, the 20th day of November, 1867, at which all registered voters of said State may vote "For a Convention," or "Against a Convention," and County for delegates to constitute the Convention-in case a majority of the votes given on that ques-By com jority of the registered voters shall have voted on the question of holding such Convention.

Second. It shall be the duty of the Boards of Registration in North Carolina, commencing fourteen days prior to the election herein ordered, and giving reasonable public notice of the time and place thereof, to revise for a period of five days the registration lists, and upon being satis-fied that any person not entitled thereto has been registered, to strike the name of such person Acts-who have not already been registered.

Third. In deciding who are to be stricken from or added to the registration lists, the Boards will be guided by the law of March 2d, 1867, and the laws supplementary thereto, and their attention is specially directed to the Supplementary Act of July 19th, 1867. Fourth. The said election will be held in each

County or District at such places as may hereaf-ter be designated, under the superintendence of. the Boards of Registration as provided by law, and in accordance with instructions hereafter to laws of North Carolina.

Fifth. All judges and clerks employed in con-ducting said election, shall, before commencing to hold the same, be sworn to the faithful per officers of the United States.

Sizth. The polls shall be opened at such voting places at eight o'clock in the forenoon, and closed at four o'clock in the afternoon of each

The sheriff and other peace officers of say "advertised." each County are required to be present during the whole time that the polls are kept open, and until the election is completed; and will be made responsible that there shall be no interference with judges of elections, or other interruption of good order. If there should be more than one good order. If there should be more than one polling place in any County, the Sheriff of the County is empowered and directed to make such assignments of his deputies, and other peace offi-cers, to the other polling places, as may, in his judgment, best subserve the purposes of quiet and order; and he is further required to report these arrangements in advance to the Command-er of the Military Post in which his County is stimuted. situated.

Ninth. Violence, or threats of violence, or of

Violence, or threats of violence, or of discharge from employment, or other oppressive means to prevent any person from registering, or exercising his right of voting, is positively prohibited, and any such attempts will be re-ported by the registrars or judges of elections to the Post Commander, and will cause the arrest and trial of the offenders by military authority. *Tenth.* All bar-rooms, saloons, and other pla-ces for the sale of liquors by retail, will be closed from 6 o'clock of the evening of the 18th of No-vember, until 6 o'clock of the morning of the 21st of November, 1867, and during this time the sale of all intoxicating liquors at or near any polling place is prohibited. The police officers of cities and towns, and the sheriffs and other peace offi-cers of Counties, will be held responsible for the strict enforcement of this prohibition, and will promptly arrest and hold for trial all persons who may transgress it. who may transgress it.

who may transgress it. Eleventh. Military interference with elections "unless it shall be necessary to repel the armed enemies of the United States, or to keep the peace at the polls" is prohibited by the Act of Congress approved February 25th, 1865, and no soldiers will be allowed to appear at any polling place, unless as citizens of the State they are qualified and are registered as voters, and then only for the purpose of voting; but the Com-manders of Posts, will keep their troops well in hand on the days of election, and will be pre-pared to act promptly if the civil authorities are unable to preserve the peace.
