BRIDGE CO.—We are pleased to under the able management of the Hon. R. H. Bridges, the Chief Engineer, Mr. H. McDowell, and the energetic Mr. Wendel Bollman, of Baltimore, connection is making rapid strides completion. Innumerable difficulties, at the commencement of the work, met and overcome with an ease and celerity to be appreciated by those who are in the magnitude and difficulties of the work. Already the two stone abutments on the North-east branch of the river, have been laid on firm and solid foundations, and are rapidly approaching the character of the masonry in that rock range work, and looks massiveness. The pivot cylinder for the fourteen feet in diameter and the put down in this country—has been sunk to a depth of twenty-three feet of the river, and into the limestone three feet. This strata has been over four feet below the bottom of which insures a safe and secure foundation. The material in the cylinder has been put to the bottom, and heavy masonry, bed plaster and hydraulic cement, for a portion of the distance, was marine divers, which, although a small, was nevertheless a sure line. In smaller, or six feet cylinders, will be used. These will not consume much more than the usual amount of iron work. It is to be noted that the schooner "Wendel" with a large amount of iron work has gone ashore twenty miles from the mouth of the river, and is a total wreck. We have no doubt that it will occasion no progress of the work, as it can, with the aid of Mr. Bollman in Baltimore, be actually needed here.

BRIDGE BETWEEN THE TWO RIVERS, is the North-east river to a point in the barn, a distance of nearly ten miles, and is a most solid and substantial structure, which will be completed in a few days by connecting the North-west, which will be rapidly completed. The advantage on the work to our city, will be immense, towards making Wilmington that it will be, one of the leading cities of the State.

RAILROAD BRIDGE.—We published communication from a gentleman "relative to the alleged intention of the bridge over North-east river, on the line of the Wilmington and Weldon Railroad. It will be remembered relative to this same matter, that we published, but as "Citizen" still we have made particular enquiry, and endeavor to satisfy him, now of the facts. It is inspected once by the Section Master, and once per month by Capt. WINNER. It is a rough structure, but a careful inspection of it perfectly, firm and built in 1857 by Military Engineers, and considerably, but has been placed upon a secure foundation. Four main trusses, and heavy freight truss, are daily and no indication of a collapse has been in it. A new bridge has, however, and will be built there as the new building over the Nouse Street.

U. S. DISTRICT COURT.—The Fall Term of the U. S. Court for the District of the Cape Fear, in the District of North Carolina, met in this city yesterday, present Hon. Geo. W. Brooks, Judge; D. H. STANBROCK, District Attorney; DANIEL R. GOODLOE, U. S. Marshal; J. H. NEFF, Deputy Marshal; and WILLIAM LARKINS, Clerk. A Grand Jury consisting of nineteen jurymen was empanelled and the Court was declared opened. Judge Brooks' charge to the jury was a lengthy and able argument, and we regret that we cannot give an extended synopsis of it here. The term business was not entered upon yesterday, but the court was adjourned until 9 o'clock this morning, when it will again meet, and when the business of the docket will be proceeded with.

REVENUE DECISION.—The following extract from a letter received here by Gen. L. G.
