On the same principle we must brag on our equality with our Gulf neighbors on the drinking and shaving question.

Don't brag too much, brothers of Alabama.—Savannah is even with you. Nary a drink here for less than a quarter, and some places charge forty cents for brandy or for whisky and soda, and haven't a quantity of any drinker lately how much a drink is.—Augusta Constitutionalist.

We don't believe that our Augusta barbers or barkeepers attempt to "cut under" their brethren of the above named cities. We don't believe that they employ any of our drunks lately how much a drink is.—Augusta Constitutionalist.

MAYOR'S COURT, SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 18TH, 1887.—STEPHEN SPILKMAN, a white man hailing from Bladen county, having come to town to purchase provisions for his family, was induced to take a drop too much, and thereby became powerless to such a degree, as to compel one of the officers of the night to furnish him with lodgings at the Station House. A LECTURE SEASON.—We are happy in being able to state that, from the present indications, a lecture season, under the auspices of the Wilmington Library Association, will soon open in our city. A number of invitations have been extended to gentlemen of well known ability in this and in other cities and towns of our State, and several have already notified their acceptance of them. We most earnestly look for the beginning. We do not in the least fear a failure in this instance, and are confident that the lecture season of '87 and '88 will be fully equal to the well remembered one of '83 and '84. There are few of those who entertained us then now left with us, but in their stead there are many whose minds are equally well capable of emitting those scintillations of thought which charm and interest the intelligent people of a community. The failure of the attempt made by the Association last winter and spring to inculcate a taste for the lecture season in the minds of our citizens should not be taken as a criterion by which to judge of the probable success of the coming season. Many causes were in operation then to prevent that success which would not be felt now, and we most heartily commend to our people, one and all, to encourage by their attendance, the attempt which will be made to establish these lectures.

AMUSEMENTS.—The "local" of the Journal had yesterday an article regretting the small amount of amusements which obtain in the way of the people of our city. His remarks are trite, and are worthy of more than a passing attention. With one of the best and most handsomely furnished theatres in the South, and with a city population of fourteen thousand souls, it is strange that the Thalian Hall should be allowed to remain idle. What we need here is good entertainment, not such as is generally found travelling through the country from place to place, and only able of itself to support the interest of the public for a few nights at a time. If some good dramatic company were to locate here, we do not doubt but that its success would be a flattering one. There are many of our people who possess in the highest degree, a taste for the legitimate drama, and it would be no very difficult task to inculcate the same appreciation in others. Ours is an intelligent community, more so for its size, than is perhaps any other in the South, and although we must confess that they sometimes have a queer way of showing it, yet they can and do readily appreciate that which is really worthy of their commendation. Let some good company of the legitimate drama order open in our city for a short season, and our word for it, its success will be a great one.

AT AUCTION YESTERDAY.—The two promissory notes advertised for some days previous, were sold yesterday at auction, by Messrs. CROLEY & MORRIS, Auctioneers. The larger one for \$2,737 56, brought \$1100, and the other, for \$807 35, was sold for \$50.

At the same time and place, the house on east side of Ft. th, between Market and Princess streets, lately the residence of F. W. KNOX, deceased, was leased for the balance of the renting year, for \$300.

Also at the same, Pew No. 17 in St. John's Church, were sold for \$300; and Pew No. 49, in St. James' Church, for \$425.

A STOPPAGE.—A few more lights are needed at the passenger depot of the Wilmington and Weldon Railroad, and the company would confer a great benefit upon the community if they would place them there. Of a dark night, such as was the last one, it is a somewhat difficult matter to steer one's way correctly among the breakers that abound there in the shape of omnibuses, baggage wagons, drays, &c. Particularly is a light needed at the long light of stairs leading from Front street into the open space below. We respectfully commend this matter to the attention of the railroad authorities.

MILITARY COURT.—A colored man by the name of Archibald Henderson, was on yesterday tried before a Military Court in this city for a violation of Paragraph VI., General Orders, No. 33, relative to the sale of alcoholic liquors. A full investigation of the case was, however, deferred on account of the absence of some of the witnesses.

COMMERCIAL REVIEW OF THE WILMINGTON MARKET, FOR THE WEEK ENDING SATURDAY, NOV. 16, 1887.

Since our last week's report, we note a decline of 35 cents per barrel in all qualities of Turpentine. The close of the market yesterday was, however, firm, at the declined prices. The sales for the week foot up some 3,053 barrels of which 1,360 barrels were sold at \$3 60 and \$3 50, and the remaining 1,693 at \$3 25 for Virgin and yellow dip, and \$2 15 for hard, per 280 lbs.

TAR.—The market for Tar ruled steady at old quotations until Tuesday last, when it met with a decline of 45 cents, at which rate the prices ruled quietly at yesterday's close. The transactions of the week were 705 barrels, —\$5 at \$2 70 and 620 at \$3 25 per bbl.

SPIRITS TURPENTINE.—The market for Spirits Turpentine has been again for the week, of a fluctuating character. Sales have been made at various figures ranging from 50 to 52 cents.—The transactions for the week foot up some 466 barrels at 50, 51, 51 1/2 and 52 cents, closing firm at 50 cents per gallon.

ROBIN.—The market for this article has very dull and inactive during the entire week.—The operations have been limited, and the few transactions which have taken place, have been confined exclusively to the lower grades. The entire sales foot up 5,083 bbls, at a decline of 25 to 30 cents on low, and 50 to 75 on high grades.—The closing transactions were at \$2 50 for Straiped Common and No. 2, and \$6 00 per bbl. for the Kahukoe brand of Pale.

EMPTY BARRELS.—The stock of empty Spirit Barrels now on hand still continues large, and there is but little demand. We quote prices as follows: \$3 30@\$3 50 for second hand, \$3 75@\$4 for selected, \$3@\$3 25 for new country, \$3 25@\$3 75 for new city, and \$3 50@\$3 75 each for New York barrels.

BEEWAX.—The enquiry for beeswax is a good one, and the article finds a ready sale at 33 to 35 cts. per lb.

BEEF CATTLE.—The market is at present well supplied with beef cattle, and with but little demand. Prime beefs sell well and readily, but the poorer kind are not much sought for. We quote on the hoof, 6@8c, for inferior and ordinary, and 9@10c. per lb. for fair to prime.

CORN MEAL.—The stock in dealers' hands is very light, and the demand from buyers very fair. Sales have been made at \$1 75@1 80 per bushel.

COTTON.—The market for Cotton has been somewhat more active during the past week than at our last report. In the earlier part the feeling rallied a little, and sales were checked off, but unfavorable advices again rechecked it, and at the close it was quiet and inactive. The weeks sales foot up 309 bales with the prices at the close at 14 1/2 cts. for low middling and 15 1/2@15 1/4 cts. for middling.

EGGS.—Sell readily from the carts at 23@24 cts. per dozen.

FISH.—Mulletts are in fair enquiry, but the receipts have been light. Sales during the week of small lots at \$5 50 for pine, and \$11 25 for oak barrels.

FERTILIZERS.—Have fallen off in stock, but the demand is light and unchanged. Quotations are as follows: Peruvian Guano, \$22 50; Pacific do., \$75@\$80; 'ataseco do., \$70; Kettlewell's Manipulated do., \$60@\$70; Phoenix do., \$55; Snowden's Manipulated do., \$75; E. F. Coe's Superphosphate of Lime, \$66; Ober's Cotton and Corn Compound, \$65; Baugh's Raw Bone Phosphate, \$65; Zell's Superphosphate of Lime, \$65; Zell's Raw Bone Phosphate, \$65; Rhodes' Standard Manure, \$65@\$70; Woolsten's Phosphate of Lime, \$65, per ton of 2,000 lbs.

FLOUR.—The market for Flour is unchanged, and prices remain nearly as last reported. The receipts are fair and are sufficient for the present demand. We quote N. C. Family at \$12@\$13. Superfine at \$11 50@\$12. Northern \$12 50@\$13 for family, \$10@\$11 for superfine and \$9 50@\$10 for fine.

GRAIN.—The supply of CORN on hand is very limited, and but for a few arrivals from Baltimore yesterday, could have been rated as actually bare. We quote, nominally, for cargo rates, \$1 40@1 45, and for store rates, \$1 60@1 65 per bushel. OATS retail from store at \$1 per bushel. In light stock, but sufficient for demand. Cow Peas are without change; the supply is fair, but the demand light. We quote small sales at \$1 25@1 30 per bushel. Carolina Rice is in better supply, but in active demand. It is quoted at 13 a 13c. per lb.

HAY.—Several late arrivals have increased the stock of hay on hand quite materially. We quote Northern at 90@95c., and Eastern at \$1 20 per 100 lbs.

LIME.—Is in good supply and with a fair enquiry. We quote from dealers' hands at \$1 90 per bbl.

LUMBER.—We have no change to report in the market for this article. PEANUTS.—The market for this article is without material change since our last report. We quote sales at \$1 70@1 75 for inferior, \$2 for fair and \$2 25 per bushel for prime.

POTATOES.—Are in fair supply, but with little demand. Sweet sell from carts and boats at from 65c @ \$1 per bushel, and Irish from the stores at \$3 50@\$4 per bbl.

POULTRY.—Continues scarce in supply, and high in price. We quote, chickens at 60@80c., and grown fowls at 90c @ \$1 per pair.

PROVISIONS.—The market continues quite bare of N. C. Bacon, and in the absence of receipts we have no sales to report. We quote hog round at 18@20c., and hams at 22@23c. per lb. Western Bacon is in fair demand, but light stock. Quotations from store are, for shoulders 15@16c., sides 18@19c., and hams 22@23c. per lb.—LARD—Is very scarce. We quote Northern at 15@17c., and North Carolina at 18c. per lb.—PORK—is in moderate demand at \$4 25 per bbl.—FRESH PORK sells from carts at 10@15c. per lb.

SALT.—The stock on hand is fully sufficient for the demand. We note sales of American at \$2 10@\$2 15, and of Liverpool at \$2 25@\$2 30 per sack.

SHINGLES.—Are lower, somewhat, and with a lighter demand. We quote small sales during the week at \$4@\$4 50 for common, and \$5 50@\$6 50 per M per contract.

TIMBER.—Is in fair demand, and arrivals during the week have found ready sales. The receipts have been light, only some 20 rafts having been reported. The ruling prices are \$7@\$7 25 for inferior, \$8@\$8 25 for ordinary, \$10@\$10 50 for fair, \$11@\$11 50 for prime, and \$12@\$12 50 for extra mill per M.

UNIFORM.—We were shown in GUTMAN'S Temple of Fashion last evening, the Uniform Shirt of the Harriet Ball Club. It is of fine blue Merino, tastily ornamented and trimmed with a white of the same material, and having on the breast plate in front, the letter H beautifully embroidered in German letters. It is a very neat affair throughout, and reflects credit on Mr. GUTMAN, at whose establishment it was manufactured.

COTTON COMING THIS WAY.—We learn that there is a large quantity of cotton in Charleston now awaiting shipment North, and that in consequence of a scarcity of shipping there, it will be carried through by rail. Among the first installments of the shipments, was a train load yesterday of some 300 bales, which passed through here for New York via the air line. There is a large quantity of it to come, and our railroads in the transportation of it will reap a much needed pecuniary benefit.

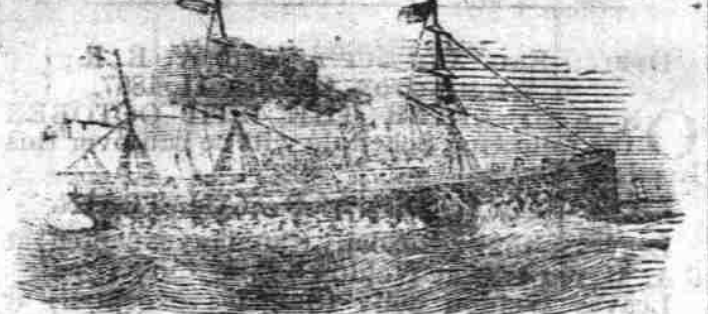
