WASHINGTON, Nov. 17 .- The Telegraph is used freely by the Radical leaders here in their efforts to hold the Alabama Convention in check. The leaders in the Convention desire to place the State in the condition of Tennessee, whereas Radical leaders here insist on nearly universal suffrage, taking the ground that the Northern elections showed hostility to negro supremacy, not to negro suffrage. The leaders are not hopeful of controlling the Convention.
