

LOCAL.

To Our Friends.—We will feel greatly obliged to such of our friends in this neighborhood as will send in to us, as soon as the facts can be ascertained, the results of the election at their several polling places.

YESTERDAY.—As we have predicted that it would, yesterday, the first of the two election days, passed off in an orderly and quiet manner, so far as the good conduct of the community is concerned, as if it had been a Sunday. Indeed, we may feel justified in saying that we have never known an election day in this city that could count so little of local disasters, as did yesterday. Much credit is due to all classes of the community for this fact, and it is to our minds the evidence of a future of good feeling between the whites and blacks of this community. So far, we have been exempt from all fears of a serious disagreement between the two elements, and we feel justified in saying, that all evidences are to the effect, that the future will be as quiet and harmonious as has been the past.

AT WORK.—Col. DAVIS, the projector of the new Hotel establishment on Front Street—the Clarendon House—has placed the workmen at their posts, and yesterday the labor of altering the interior arrangements of the two buildings, known as the Potter buildings, and in which the hotel is to be located, was commenced. The work will be pushed rapidly forward, and we may soon hope to have a new and handsome hotel establishment opened here. Col. Davis' recommendations are very strong, and we believe that he is able to fulfill all of the expectations formed of him, and that his house will be of the very first order.

NOT MUCH OF A FIGHT.—A little difficulty occurred between two gentlemen of this city yesterday morning, relative to a debt due by one to the other, of \$4.50. Blows succeeded to words, and after a little sparring had passed between them, they were separated, the only injuries being a few stray hairs torn away, and a couple of ruffled shirt bosoms. The damages done were assessed by three disinterested individuals at exactly \$4.50, just the amount of the debt, although we don't know that the same is thereby considered cancelled.

THE CIRCUS.—It will doubtless be a source of much gratification to many to know that we are at last to have here in Wilmington a genuine Circus. The huge posters placed on many of the public thoroughfares of the city, will inform the pleasure-seekers that FOREPAUGH'S Mammoth Circus and Menagerie will be here on Friday and Saturday, the 29th and 30th inst., and will perform then.
