Special Correspondence of the Washington Chronicle. CHARLESTON, S. C., Nov. 28, 1867. The returns thus far received indicate that this State has gone "for a convention" by a majority variously estimated at from twenty to thirty thousand.

Meeting of Colored Republicans in Richmond, Va. RICHMOND, Nov. 29.—A meeting of the colored Republicans was held this afternoon, at the Capitol Park, at which resolutions were adopted, declaring that, in view of the efforts of the Conservatives to intimidate the colored voters, the Hon. James M. Botts, Governor Pierpont, Franklin Stearns and others, be requested to call a State Convention of white Republicans, to assist and direct the colored people in carrying the election for the ratification of the constitution.

Arrival of Immigrants in Charleston. CHARLESTON, Nov. 28.—The Bremen Bark GAUSS has arrived here, with 152 immigrants, under the auspices of the State Immigration Board. They were warmly welcomed by their friends and the citizens generally. Only one death occurred during the voyage.
