The returns thus far received indicate that this State has gone "for a convention" by a majority varisusly estimated at from twenty to thirty thousand. My judgment is that it will not exceed the former figure. The whole number of registered votes in the State is 125,386, of whom 79,585 are colored and 45,751 are white, which should give a majority for a convention of 38,834, granting that the whole white registered vote is against the calling of a convention.
