The whole registered vote of the State is 174,717. It is necessary that a majority of this vote, to wit, 87,359, shall have been cast on the question of a Convention.

MONTGOMERY, ALA., Nov. 29.—General Order No. 234, by Gen. Pope sets forth that the reconstruction Convention having provided as required by Congressional enactment for levy and assessment of such taxes on property of the State as necessary for payment of expenses of the Convention.

The majority of the Committee on franchise reported back an additional section to franchise and an article empowering the next Legislature to disfranchise rebels who have not aided in reconstructing the State under the laws of Congress which was tabled by a radical majority until to-morrow.

An ordinance was passed declaring valid all official acts of public officers in this State under military authority during the existence of the present provisional Government as if the same had been done in due course of law.

A bureau of immigration has been established by the Convention.

Paper from Flax. Interesting samples of paper made from New Zealand flax have been forwarded to England. While rather highly colored, the flax paper has a singularity of texture and strength which suggests an excellent paper for bank-notes.
