SAINT ANDREW'S DAY AND ADVENT SUN-DAY. - Saturday last was observed here as Saint Andrew's Day, and the following day as Advent Sunday. It was the seventeen hundred and ninety eighth anniversary of the martyrdom of the Saint.

St. Andrew was the younger brother of Simon, surramed Peter, and was one of the disciples of John the Baptist. He was eminently successful in his labors in the ministration of the Gospel throughout many of the Northern Countries of Europe and finally met his death in Achaia through condemnation at the bands of the Roman proconsal Ageas. He died upon the cross, to which he was confined by cords instead of nails, after having undergone innumerable parbarities, and from which, during the two days of his final agony there, he preached to and instructed the people of the surrounding Country in that faith in which he was then dying.

St. Andrew was chosen by the Scotch as their tutelar saint and some evidences have been adduced by these people to prove that his relics were removed by a pious Grecian Monk, named Regulus, and deposited in

Church, since the year 359 A. D.

Advent, depends upon the festival of Saint indulged in. Andrew, and is always the Sunday nearest to the commemoration of the martyrdom of that Saint.
