SAINT ANDREW'S DAY AND ADVENT SUNDAY.—Saturday last was observed here as Saint Andrew's Day, and the following day as Advent Sunday.

St. Andrew was the younger brother of Simon, surnamed Peter, and was one of the disciples of John the Baptist.

St. Andrew was chosen by the Scotch as their tutelary saint and some evidences have been adduced by these people to prove that his relics were removed by a pious Grecian Monk, named Rogulus, and deposited in Fifehire.

By the best evidences, it would appear that St. Andrew suffered martyrdom on the 30th of November, in the year 69, and the anniversary is therefore held on that day.

Advent Sunday, or the first Sunday in Advent, depends upon the festival of Saint Andrew, and is always the Sunday nearest to the commemoration of the martyrdom of that Saint.
