HORRIBLE MURDER.—Mr. George Ferrell, of Indian Ridge, Currituck county, was found on Sunday morning last with his throat cut from ear to ear, near the house of one Sol. Jones, who keeps a drinking establishment at a place called Iron Ridge, about thirty miles from Norfolk. It seems that Ferrell visited Norfolk on Thursday last week, with a drove of cattle, which having disposed of, and having made some purchases, he left for home on Saturday. It is supposed that Jones, the keeper of the house near which his body was found, was the murderer, and his having disappeared from the neighborhood lends additional reason to this supposition. Ferrell was a married man of about thirty-five years of age, with a wife and one child living. He was formerly a member of the 56th Regiment of North Carolina troops, and served faithfully throughout the entire war.

THE WELDON HOTEL.—This building was rented out at Weldon by public auction on Tuesday last. It was leased by Mr. Benjamin Cheatham, of Raleigh, at the rate of \$5,000 per year, for a lease of three years. Mr. Cheatham is spoken of as a gentleman of means and energy, and is at once to push forward his arrangements for the purpose of opening the house at an early day. The bidding on the occasion of the lease was a spirited one, there being a number of contestants in the field.

NORFOLK.—The Seaboard Railroad is drawing heavily on the produce of North Carolina and the city of Norfolk is growing fat on the sweat of our North State farmers. About 400 bales of cotton, besides tobacco, rosin, cotton yarn, &c., were landed in Norfolk by the Seaboard Road on Saturday last.

COAST SURVEY.—The Newbern Republican says: The United States schooner Argot of the Coast Survey under command of Capt. J. H. Porter, left there on Monday last and sailed down the river, to resume her work of surveying the waters of Eastern North Carolina.

DISCONTINUED.—The Daily Advertiser, the publication of which was recently commenced in Raleigh, has been discontinued.

RALEIGH NATIONAL BANK.—The Annual Meeting of the Stockholders of the Raleigh National Bank was held at their banking house in that city on Wednesday last. Messrs. R. W. Pulliam, George W. Swepson, W. J. Hawkins, A. S. Meriman, and W. H. Willard were chosen as Directors for the ensuing year. At a subsequent meeting of the new Board Col. R. W. Pulliam was appointed President; W. B. Gulick, Cashier; C. J. Iredell, Teller; and W. Hal. Harrison, Corresponding Clerk and Bookkeeper.

BASE BALL.—The Vance and the Neuse Base Ball Clubs of Goldsboro' had a match game in that place last week, resulting in the Vances being badly beaten, the Neuse Club having conquered by thirteen runs. There are, however, two more games in the rubber, before the contest is fully decided.

FIRE IN EVERETTSTVILLE.—An unoccupied dwelling house, the property of W. G. Morisey, Esq., situated in Everettville, in Wayne county, was destroyed by fire last week. It is supposed to have been the work of an incendiary.

SCHOOL IN WELDON.—Mr. G. Wm. Prince, of Sussex county, Va., and a graduate of the Richmond College will open a school in Weldon on Monday next.

THE TRANSIT OF COTTON.—The Roanoke News says that the transit of cotton is still improving, the past three days showing a decided improvement upon last week.

WAKE FOREST COLLEGE.—The twenty-third anniversary of the Euzeilian and Philomathean Societies of this institution will be held on the 14th of February. The orators are Mr. J. T. Wescott, of Smithville, in this State, for the former, and Mr. F. M. Pennington, of Bullock county, Ala., for the latter. The Committee of Arrangements are Messrs. R. S. Pritchard, J. B. Brewer, A. COMMERCIAL REVIEW.

WILMINGTON MARKET, FOR THE WEEK ENDING FRIDAY, JAN. 17, 1888.

TURPENTINE.—The market for Crude Turpentine has advanced 5 cents per bbl. in price since our last report. The advance was obtained early in the week and since then the market has ruled steady, closing firm at the prices of \$3 10 for yellow and \$1 35 for hard #2 200 lbs. The sales foot up some \$389 ibns.

TAR.—Has been in fair demand, and prices have advanced 5 cents per bbl. on our last week's sales. The receipts have been light, and we note a partial decline, one small lot having sold on Thursday at 10 cents. To-day, however, sales were effected at 40 cents, and as such we reckon the closing rates. The sales amount to only some \$87 casks.

ROBIN.—No change worthy of report has occurred in the market for this article. The transactions have been limited to the lower grades, nothing whatever having been done in the finer qualities. The stock on hand is small, and the receipts since our last report have been very light. The week's sales are \$2,889 ibns. with closing prices at \$3 for common, \$3 12 1/2 for strained and No. 2, and \$3 25 for bbl. for low No. 1.

COTTON.—The market for Cotton continued quiet and without material change until yesterday when an advance was obtained. The sales for the entire week foot up 231 bales, the market closing firm at 14 cents for low middling, and 14 1/2 cents for middling per lb.

EMPTY BARRELS.—The stock of empty Spirit Barrels now on hand still continues plentiful, and there is but little demand. We quote prices as follows \$2 20 for second hand, \$3 75 for \$3 00 for new city, and \$3 50 for 75 each for New York barrels.

BEEWAX.—The enquiry for beewax is a good one, and the article finds a ready sale at 33 @35 cts. per lb.

BEEF CATTLE.—The market is at present well supplied with beef cattle, and with but little demand. We quote on the hoof, 7@8c. for inferior and ordinary, and 9@11 c. per lb. for fair to prime.

CORN MEAL.—The stock in dealers' hands is a fair one, and the demand from buyers moderate. Sales have been made at \$1 60 @ 65 per bushel.

EGGS.—Are arriving quite freely and are selling from stores at retail, at 20@22 cents per dozen.

FERTILIZERS.—Are in light stock but limited demand. Quotations are as follows: Peruvian Guano, 80@; Pacific Guano, 75@80; Catapasco do., 70; Kettlewell's Manipulated do., 80@87; Phoenix do., 85; Snowden's Manipulated do., 87; E. F. Coe's Superphosphate of Lime, 66; Ober's Cotton and Corn Compound, 66; Baugh's Raw Bone Phosphate, 60@65; Snowden's Ammoniated Potash Phosphate, 65; Zell's Superphosphate of Lime, 65; Zell's Raw Bone Phosphate, 65; Rhodes' Standard Manure, 65@70; Woolsten's Phosphate of Lime, 65, per ton of 2,000 lbs.

FLOUR.—We have no change to note in the market for this article. The stock on hand is fair and fully sufficient for the demand. We refer to table for prices.

GRAIN.—The market for Corn has advanced 2 cents per bushel since our last report. Two cargoes, containing in all some 3,745 bushels have arrived from the Eastern countries and have been put upon the market and been sold at \$1 27 1/2 per bushel. The demand is a moderate one and we quote store rates at \$1 40 per bushel.

OATS.—Nothing doing except from stores. Retail rates \$1 @ 10 per bushel.—PRAIS—are much reduced in stock, and we quote them at \$185 @ 150 per bushel.—RICE—is in good supply, but with only a light demand. We quote for Carolina 9@10 1/2 per lb. by the cask.

HAY.—The supply of Hay on hand is still a moderate one, and the demand fair. One lot of 300 bales Northern sold from wharf at \$1 50. We refer to table for store rates.

LIME.—The market is sufficiently well supplied with Lime to meet the present demand. It sells from store at \$1 80 @ 1 90 per cask.

LUMBER.—We have no change to report in the market for this article. The demand is light, and sales are made at the following prices: Ordinary assortment Cuba cargoes, \$17 00 @ 18 00 Ordinary assortment Hayti cargoes, 16 00 Full cargoes wide boards, 30 00 @ 33 00 Full cargoes flooring boards, rough 20 00 @ 23 00 Split stuff, as per specifications, 23 00 Deals, 3 x 9, 17 00 Prime River Flooring, 15 00 @ 15 00 PEANUTS—Arrive very slowly, but the demand for them is not so brisk as during last week. Good qualities, however, find ready sale, and we quote them at our close at \$3 @ 40 for ordinary and \$3 50 @ 60 for extra qualities.

POTATOES.—Are in fair supply, but with little demand. Sweet sell from carts and boats at from \$1 @ 30 per bushel; and Irish from the stores at \$5 per bbl.

POULTRY.—Is in full supply and at present dull. We quote chickens at 40 @ 50c., grown fowls at 60 @ 70c. per pair, and turkeys at \$1 25 @ \$1 50 each.

PROVISIONS.—No material change has occurred in the market for North Carolina BACON during the past week. Only occasional small sales have taken place and the demand is a light one. We quote, therefore, small sales at 18 @ 20c. for hams, and 16 @ 17c. for hog round. Western is in moderate supply and little demand. Store rates are 18 @ 19 cts. for shoulders, 15c. for sides and 12 1/2 @ 13 cts. for loins.

LARD.—The market is well supplied and the enquiry a slight one. Store rates are 17 @ 18c. for North Carolina and 18 @ 15c. per lb. for Northern.

PORK.—We quote Mess Pork at \$3 50 per barrel, and Fresh Pork at 10 @ 12c. per lb.

SALT.—Is in good supply but with a limited demand. We quote it from store at \$2 @ 23 05 for American and \$2 10 @ 23 15 per sack for Liverpool.

SHINGLES.—There is absolutely nothing doing in the market for shingles. We quote nominally at \$2 25 @ 25 for common and \$3 @ 4 for contract.

TIMBER.—Arrives very slowly and there is no change to record since our last report. The sales amount to only some twelve or fifteen rafts at \$5 @ 50 for inferior, \$6 @ 67 for ordinary, \$7 75 @ 8 for fair, \$9 for prime and \$11 50 for extra mill per M-foot.

WOOD.—Is dull and the market fully supplied. We quote by the load at \$3 75 @ 35 for ash and pine, and \$3 25 @ 33 for oak per cord.
