WASHINGTON ITEMS.

The commission, composed of Generals Sherman, Sheridan and Angur, appointed sometime since for the revision of the army regulations, has nearly completed its labor. General Sherman is devoting a large share of his attention to this duty. The revision will make no material change in the matter of regulations, though in some portions a new system of classification of subjects has been adopted. The report of the commission will be made to General Grant. As soon as the report is made, General Sherman will return to the West.

A meeting of citizens of Colorado, now in Washington, was held on Saturday to consider the means necessary to secure the admission of their Territory into the Union. New claims to such recognition, arising from a rapid increase in population and wealth were set forth, and the agreement was made to work in harmony to accomplish the end in view. A memorial has been prepared, concerning this matter, which will be laid before Congress at an early day.

The Committee on Ways and Means is still engaged in considering the tobacco tax. The main question that wants to be served in the matter make it very difficult for the committee to perfect a bill. There is a great difference of opinion as to whether the tax should fall on raw material solely or on both the raw and the manufactured article. There is also a good deal of opposition to high tariff on imported tobacco. Strong efforts will be made to have the duty on the same reduced.

The case of Elged against the United States, which has been pending in the courts for a long time, was disposed of in the Supreme Court to-day, judgment being rendered in favor of the Government. The case involves half a million of dollars, the proceeds of abandoned and captured property in the Southern States.

At a meeting of the Senate Military Committee to-day, a large number of army appointments were acted upon. There was some discussion in the Committee to-day in regard to a reduction of the army, and the idea met with general approval.

A movement is being made here among Western politicians to make Hon Hannibal Hamlin of Maine, the nominee of the Republican party for next Vice President.

The Senate Finance Committee will meet to-morrow, to consider the cases of Assessors and Collectors of Internal Revenue, who have been suspended from office by President Johnson.

For the week ending on Tuesday, February 4th, there will be issued from the Patent Office two hundred and eighty-two patents. During the past week four hundred and fifty applications and seventy-five caveats were filed.

Paraffine, it has been discovered, is an excellent preservative of fresco walls which are beginning to crumble with age.

On the 30th inst., a great "free trade dinner" is to be given at Mr. William C. Bryant, by several prominent politicians of New York.

Lough, the English sculptor, has produced a statue suggested by Miss Landon's poem, "The Lost Pielid." The moment chosen is that immediately preceding her death. She has removed her crown and is in the act of dropping it into the water, as she descends on a sphere belted with a zone bearing the hours. The work is very highly spoken of by those who have seen it.

Dan Rice announces himself a candidate for president, and the New York World irreverently says he is used to swinging round the circle.

A well known pugilist of Brooklyn, called Jim Dunn, holds one of the most lucrative positions under the tax collector.

Brevet Colonel W. R. Pease has been detailed by General Grant as professor of military tactics in the University of Wisconsin.

When a western village has established within its limits a keno bank and a billiard room, it adds "city" to its former title.

GENERAL NEWS.

In all the national cemeteries now repose the remains of 328,000 Union soldiers.
Quebec owes \$3,050,543, of which \$145,662 has accumulated during the past two years, although there has been no occasion for extraordinary expenditure.

Iowa has packed, during the season just closed, 172,914 hogs, an increase of more than fifty thousand from last year. The average weight of the hogs was about forty-five pounds less however.

New Jersey has eighty-two papers, of which thirteen are dailies and two semi-weekly. Eight of the dailies are republican and five democratic in politics, while twenty-nine of the weeklies are democratic to twenty six republican. Four of the papers are printed in German.

Mr. John Henry, youngest son of Patrick Henry, died at Red Hill, Charlotte County, Virginia, on the 7th inst., aged 72 years. He was highly respected by his fellow citizens.

Large numbers of immigrants are settling in the vicinity of Fort Smith, Ark. Nearly all the lands have been preempted.

Kansas legislators are allowed by their own vote in daily newspapers, each to choose for himself.

It is frequently the case in Canada that in digging wells for drinking water, salt veins are struck, which bring in large sums of money to their owners, but have a bad effect on their habits.

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Two operas by Felicien David are soon to be brought out in Milan. They are called "Lalla Rookh" and "Eroclone."

Mail robberies are becoming frequent in Texas that the people are refusing to avail themselves of the assistance of the post-office in communication with their friends.

A number of New York merchants, with Mr. Peter Cooper at their head have presented to Mr. Seward a picture by Letz, descriptive of the traffic which secured Alaska to the United States.

Professor Agassiz is to lecture next week, for the first time in ten years or more. He makes an exception in favor of Philadelphia, and will appear nowhere else.

The meetings of the Young Men's Christian Association in Chicago have been interrupted by a crazy intruder named Barnes, whose disturbance of the anniversary meetings in Boston last year is some of our readers have not forgotten. He was "hung down" by a vigorous prayer meeting in Chicago, and writes a pathetic letter of remonstrance to the Tribune about the outrage.

Mayor Hoffman of New York, who is a disciple of Mr. Bery, and a member of the society for the prevention of cruelty to animals, has prosecuted a man for beating his horse.
