PROVOST COURT.

HEADQUARTERS SECOND MILITARY DISTRICT, CHARLOTTE, S. C., March 23, 1888. SPECIAL ORDERS, No. 93. [Extract.] VI. A Provost Court is hereby constituted at Wilmington, North Carolina, for the counties of New Hanover, Brunswick, Bladen and Columbus, North Carolina, with jurisdiction, as restricted by paragraph II, of General Orders No. 18, current series, from these Headquarters, of all civil cases arising within the limits of the court, in which the amount in controversy does not exceed three hundred (\$300) dollars; and of all offenses, not under the Articles of War, which may be referred to it by the Post Commander, except murder, manslaughter, assault with intent to kill, violation of the laws against dueling, perjury, rape and arson. Sentences and judgments will not be executed until approved by the Commanding General.

The court will ordinarily sit and be always open at Wilmington, North Carolina; but will, when needed, repair to and temporarily sit at other points within said Counties, as the interest of justice may require. The procedure of the court will be assimilated to that of magistrates under the laws of the State, and will conform to the regulations prescribed for like courts in General Orders. The proceedings of the court will be forwarded through the Post Commander for review and final decision. J. C. Mann, Esq., is hereby appointed sole Judge of said court, and his compensation as such fixed at one hundred (\$100) dollars per month. The court may employ a clerk at a compensation not exceeding three (\$3) dollars a day, who shall keep the records of its proceedings. The funds accruing from fines and costs will be appropriated to defray the expenses of the court. Simple rules and forms of procedure, and the fee and charges prescribed by the court, will be published by the court for general information. The sheriffs of the said counties of New Hanover, Brunswick, Bladen and Columbus, their deputies and all constables therein, are required to execute the orders and decrees of the court. At the end of each month a return of the cases tried, and of all receipts and expenditures, with vouchers, will be made by the court to the Post Commander, and by him forwarded to these Headquarters. The following are some of the regulations governing a Provost Court: No Provost Court will entertain jurisdiction of any case, nor will any Post Commander refer any case for trial to any Court, unless it shall appear to the satisfaction of the Post Commander, and shall be certified by him, either—First, That the case involves matters of difference between employer and employed respecting rights under the provisions of military orders; or Second, That the proper State authorities have refused, or unreasonably failed, or are unable to take action needed for the protection of persons or property; or Third, That there is good ground for believing, upon facts shown, which must be preserved on record, that impartial justice cannot be secured in the State Courts by reason of prejudice on account of race, color or former condition.

District of Cape Fear in the District of North Carolina. WHEREAS a libel has been filed in the District Court of the United States for the District of Cape Fear, on the seventh day of November, 1887, by George Harris, William Harris, and Andrew L. Howell, partners under the name and style of Harris & Howell, owners of the steamer Brandt, of Wilmington, and John F. Gilbert, Master of the said steamer, for themselves and all others, against the schooner Eva Adele, her tackle, apparel, furniture and cargo—alleging in substance, that the said schooner Eva Adele, while endeavoring to get into the Port of Wilmington, on the South side of New Inlet Bar, amid the South Bockeys where she stuck fast, and was unable to relieve herself from the perilous condition in which she was then placed. The said John F. Gilbert, Master of said steamer Brandt, upon discovering the condition of said schooner, Eva Adele, immediately proceeded to the place where the said schooner, Eva Adele, was ashore, at the immediate peril of his own steamer, and approached near enough to said schooner, Eva Adele, to receive a line, and draw her from the breakers, and after considerable difficulty succeeded in hauling the said schooner from the shore, and towed her into the Port of Wilmington; and that they are entitled to a reasonable share of schooner and cargo, for the salvage thereof, praying process against said schooner and cargo, and reasonable and proper salvage, and that the said schooner, her tackle, apparel, furniture, and cargo, may be condemned and sold to pay such salvage, with costs, charges and expenses. Now, therefore, in pursuance of the motion under the seal of the said Court to me directed and delivered, I do hereby give public notice to all persons claiming the said ship, her tackle, apparel and furniture, and cargo, or in any manner interested therein, that they be and appear before the said District Court, to be held in the City of Wilmington, in and for the District of Cape Fear, on the Monday next, succeeding the fourth Monday in April, then and there to interpose their claims, and to make their allegations in that behalf.
