The news yesterday of the reception o Gen. Canby's order was soon spread through out the city, and the regret which it caused soon found its way among all. This regret has already sought to find vent in appeals to the Commanding General, to countermand the order, and to allow Col. Frank to remain. These appeals will soon be completed and presented, and will be the sense of the entire people, irrespective of political sentiments, past or present, or of race, color or condition. Of a verity do we believe that there cannot be found five respectable men of this city, who would not gladly and most willingly sign a request that he be rctained.

It is not often that an officer is so successful in the discharge of his duty as Col. Frank has been, as the good state of affairs in our city at this time will well testify, and we are confident that General Canby will ray due regard to the expressed wishes of the entire community, and will allow him to remain where he is personally so highly esteemed, and where his administration of affairs has been so eminently successful.

READ THIS .- We have, on a previous oc casion, boasted of the inherent good health of the city of Wilmington, yet, never, we think, without sufficient cause. We are aware that this is represented at the North as a very unhealthy place, and have been assured that many who would otherwise "pitch their tents" in our midst, and bring with them much money, and much business ener; gy and enterprise for the proper investment of that money, are thereby deterred from doing so. These reports can scarcely emanate from those who have ever resided in this city, but are doubtless but the idle tales of travelers passing through the place, and seldom, if ever, stopping here.

As a relutation of these talse reports there can be furnished no better witness than a reference to the monthly statistics of our cemeteries, and it is with much gratification that we refer to the report of the Secretary and Treasurer of Oakdale Cemetery Company, as published in our columns to-day. By this report it will be seen that there have been but five interments made there during the month of April. Of these five, two were for consumption, one for inflammation of the brain, one for paralysis, and the remaining one for dysentery. This latter is the only one of the five that can be reckoned as a disease of the climate, as the other four can be fairly classed as constitutional complaints. From the colored cemetery, Pine Forest, we have as yet received no returns for the month, and will therefore baseour calculations on the reports made from Oakdale. Now, supposing there are fifteen thousand inhabitants in Wilmington, eight thousand of whom are colored, and seven thousand white, it will follow that among this seven thousand white persons there has been but one death from climatical causes during an entire month of thirty days. Are we not, therefore, safe in assuming that one of the healthiest, if not the health est place in the known world, and does not the above fact brand as undeniably false all reports to the contrary? This thing should be known abroad, and when known cannot fail in being fully appreciated. If we have friends at the North who desire truly and sincerely our commercial welfare, let them aid us in giving this fact its proper publicity, and thereby induce an emigration of the so much needed capital and enterprise to our midst.




