### NIGHT DISPATCHES. (From the Star.) From Washington.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 19. The following from the Treasury Department is dated June 6, 1872:

"The attention of all parties interested is particularly directed to the following provisions of an act making appropriations to supply deficiencies in the appropriations for the service of the government for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1872, and for former years, and for other purposes, approved May. 1872, and the regulations for carrying the

same into effect: Section 5. That the Secretary of the Treasury be and he is hereby authorized and directed to pay to the lawful owners, or their legal representatives, of all cotton seized after the 30th day of June, 1865, by the agents of the government unlawfully and in violation of their instructions, the net proceeds, without interest, of the sales of said cotton actually paid into the treasury of the United States; provided that the receipts thereof shall be taken and received in full satisfaction of all claims against the United States for, or on account of the seizure of said cotton, and a sufficient sum for such payment is hereby appropriated out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated; and, provided further, that the foregoing Then the Chairman, rising in his provisions shall not apply to any clain now any claim not filed in the Treasury Department within six months after the passage of this act, and the sum of \$20,000 is appropriated for the payment of the necessary expenses of defending the United States in respect to claims for said proceeds to be expended under the direction of the Sceretary

"First, Every claim shall be stated in a petition addressed to the Secretary and signed and duly verified on the oath or atfirmation of the claimant or claimants.

"Second.
