That any cow, or other CAT-TLE of ANY KIND, found running at large, within the corporate limits of this city, shall be impounded by the City Marshal and the owner required to pay a fine of Ten (10) dollars before the same shall be released SEC, 2d. Any ordinance or parts there. conflicting herewith, are hereby repealed.

The above ordinance was adopted by the Board of Aldermen on the 24th day of June 1875-and will go into effect, on and after Monday June 28th 1875.
