WHITE WOMEN STRIPPED AND FLOGGED!! THEIR PITIFUL PLEADINGS AND CRIES FOR MERCY HEARD MORE THAN A MILE!!!

WHITE MEN THE PERPETRATORS - IN DISGUISE AND AT MIDNIGHT.

We have information entirely reliable that about the first of the present month of April, in the vicinity of Catherine's Lake, in Onslow county, two white women who lived alone and who led respectable lives, were taken from their house at about the hour of nine o'clock at night by a gang of white men who were disguised, stripped naked and flogged in a most terrible and inhuman manner, with stout switches, until the skin was flayed from their bodies in dozens of places, and the blood formed in pools on the ground where they were being punished.

That such things can occur in the State of North Carolina in this day and generation, is astounding. That creatures who call themselves men - eye-white men as these incarnate fiends boast of being, should be permitted thus to fly alive and torture women is truly wonderful. It is stated as a fact that the attention of persons residing more than a mile away from the scene of this outrage were attracted by the cries of these poor creatures for mercy.
