OUR COLORED PUBLIC SCHOOLS .-Not being able to attend the examinations just closed, of the public schools, under the supervision of Mr. A. B. Lind, we have obtained the following interesting information from a getleman who was present:

The examinations are spoken of as highly creditable throughout, to superintendent, teachers and pupils; and this by one who is able to judge. This result demonstrates the wisdom of the School Committee in placing these schools entirely in the hands of colored teachers, with a colored superintendent. Appreciating this fact, as was expected, we have no doubt that a strong effort has been made by all concerned to sustain the action of the Committee, by the accomplishment of good results in

This movement goes so far towards putting the colored people on an equal footing with other classes of their fellow-citizens. For we hold that no class can be the equal of another, so long as it has to borrow its teachers from its neighbors of other classes. We are not opposed to white teachers teaching the colored schools, but are pleased to see that colored teachers can be found who are fully capable of doing so.
