Editors Post.—On Saturday the 10th inst., pursuant to a call of the County Republican Executive Committee of Warren county, the delegates from various townships assembled in the court house in Warren and were called to order by the chairman of the Executive Committee, Richard Burgess, who was unanimously elected permanent President of the convention.

The convention was composed of thirty one delegates, and stood seventeen for Thorne and fourteen for Hyman.

After preliminary business had been disposed of the convention proceeded to elect delegates to the Congressional and State Conventions. It was required that each delegate elected to either of the conventions should not receive less than sixteen votes, that being a majority of all the delegates composing the convention. King, and feeling inexpressibly grateful to him for past valuable services rendered the great national Republican party, hereby express our preference for him to represent this Congressional District in the next Congress of the United States, and earnestly request the Congressional Convention to tender him the nomination.
