It was with a teeling of pleasure and pride that I read your article "Education" in the last issue of the Post, in which you advocate a general uprising of the colored people in favor of this all important subject.

"Knowledge is power," is the trite and ancient maxim; but shall it be sought after merely because it is power? "Learning is useful," and although we live in a utilitarian age, shall it be commended merely because it can be turned to a good account because profitable by way of speculation, and for the virtue it may possess of giving one man an advantage over his neighbor who hath it not? Shall literature be favored merely because it adorns its votary and lends a finish, a charm, an elegance to his productions?

To our youth the vast field lies teeming with rich and delicious truits, that cluster luxuriantly at every step, grateful to the taster, pleasant to the sight, nourishing to the mind. These precions fruits fall not into the lap of the idle passer by, who strolls to linger a moment, and casts but the wistful glance; but can be gathered by him alone who strives to secure them with such friends as Diligence and Virtue. "Youth is the vernal season of life, and the blossoms it then buts forth are indications of those future fruits to be gathered in succeeding periods."

I approve your proposition for the calling of a general meeting, for the special purpose of creating a feeling in behalf of education: but I would suggest that it be not confined to Wilmington alone, but that the country be represented by at least two or three delegates from each Township, and at least one delegate be selected from the different school committees. As we have in Lincoln township two public schools in operation, with the prospect of a third, I think we are at least entitled to a voice in this meeting. I would also suggest that a committee of

your leading colored men wait upon his Honor, Mayor Martin, and obtain his consent to preside over this meeting. In so doing they will have a presiding officer, whom none better could be selected. Strong in his principles of undoubted honor and integrity, of superior abilities, and the true friend of the colored people, he would at once infuse a feeling of interest upon this subject which would impress afresh on the minds of our youth that the highly cultivated intellect is the wealth at least to secure real independence; to purchase, as far as frail mortals can, true happiness in this

And in thus doing we will have arrived at the highest mark of duty which we owe to ourselves, to the State, and to God, as men and as citizens.
