THE ATTENTION OF THOSE CONCERNed is called to the following Ordinance concerning persons who bring produce to Market. It will be strictly enforced.

City Marshal.

W. P. CANADAY, Market Ordinance. SECTION '4.

Par. 7 .-- No person who shall bring to market any Meat, Poultry, or Game-dead or alive -Vegetables, Fruits, Fish, Oysters, Eggs Butter, Lard, Bacon, or any other articles which are usually vended in market, (except such of the foregoing articles as shall have been imported from beyond seas) shall sell the same, or offer them for sale, outside the Market limits.

within Market hours; and every person viola-

ting this provision shall forfeit and pay fifty

dollars for every offence. PAR .- No person shall buy or sell in the City, or within one mile from the limits thereof, during Market hours, any quantity of provisions, or other articles usually vended in Market, for the purpose of re-sale or speculation, nor in such quantities as to prevent others from having a fair share of the same, the Clerk of the Market being the Judge. And any person vicating these provisions shall forfeit and pay

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, RALBIGH, NORTH CAROLINA, February 16th, 1872. Whereas, the General Assembly of North Carolina did on the 8th day of February, A. D., 1872, pass the following act, to wit: AN ACT concerning the Robeson County Outlaws.

Sec. 1. The General Assembly of North Carelina do enact: That in addition to the reward already offered for the arrest of certain outlaws and murderers in the county of Robeson, His Excellency, Gov. Tod R. Caldwell, is hereby authorized and empowered by public proclomation to offer as an additional reward to those authorized by act of the General Assembly, ratified the 13th day of February, A. D., 1871, tea thousand dellars for the arrest and delivery, dead or alive, for the body of Henry Berry Low-ery to the proper authorities of the State, and a reward of five thousand dollars each for the arrest and delivery, dead or alive, of the bodies of Boss Strong, Stephen Lowery, Thomas Low-

ery, George Applewhite and Andrew Strong to proper authorities of the State. Sec. 2. This act shall be in torce from and Ratified the 8th day of February, A. D., 1872. Now, therefore I, Tod R. Caldwell, Governor of the State of North Carolina, by virtue of the authority in me vested by said act above recited do issue this my proclamation offering the fol-lowing rewards in addition to those heretofore

offered to be paid in currency to the party or parties who shall apprehend and deliver, dead or alive, any of the outlaws herinafter named, to the Sheriff of Robeson county, viz: For Henry Berry Lowery, Ten Thousand dol-For Boss Strong, Stephen Lowery Thomas Lowey, George Applewhite and Andrew Strong,

Five Thousand dollars each.
