SENATOR ABBOTT'S SEAT.—Senator Carpenter will present a strong minority report signed by himself and Senator Rice, declaring Gen. Abbott entitled to his seat, and setting forth at very great length the reasons which have compelled them to dissent. They adduce numerous English and American decisions in support to their views, and in the course of the argument insist that the circumstances which may well induce the House of Representatives to depart from the ancient rule of practice in determining the elections of its members do not exist in relation to the election of Senators, the votes for whom are matters of record, cast *en bloc*, and not by ballot. It is, therefore, easy to ascertain whether such votes were cast in ignorance of a candidate's ineligibility.

SENEGAL WALCOTT'S CAPTURE.—A \$200 PRIZE.—This efficient officer having received the news a few days ago, from Capt. James Borden, that one John Mills was in the city, who murdered a man in Halifax on the 16th of last month by the name of Travis Washington, and escaped, and for whom the Governor had offered a reward of \$200; and the Sergeant bearing in his mind the description given of the fugitive, by Capt. Borden, according to the Governor's proclamation, was passing by the market about ten minutes after his interview with Capt. Borden, when he espied Mills coming along, and approaching him, asked him what his name was. Mills replied, stuttering badly, that his name was Green; whereupon the Sergeant arrested him and carried him before the City Marshal, who immediately telegraphed the news of Mill's apprehension to Sheriff Reed, of Halifax, who returned an answer, requesting the Marshal to keep him in custody until he could come for him. The \$200 reward is Sergeant Walcott's prize. Capt. Borden also deserves the thanks of the community at large.

CONTINUED.

THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

CITY COURT.—The City Court has been continued under charge of Hon. Edward Croly, by authority of an ordinance of the Board of Aldermen. All fines and costs are paid into the City Treasury, and the presiding judge is allowed the fees fixed by law for the compensation of Justices of the Peace. Some change is desirable whereby the jurisdiction of the court may be enlarged, and so far as possible, the action of the court in cases of violation of City Ordinances and petty misdemeanors, made final.

The receipts nearly keep pace with the expenditures. It is right and proper that disorderly persons and criminals should be made to pay well for their misbehavior.

The cost of this department compared with the previous year is, 1871, \$3,865 64, 1872, \$2,966 10. Decrease is \$899 54.

GAS AND OTHER LIGHTS.—This department is charged with the expense of

lighting, repairing, placing new lamp posts, pay of lamp lighters, and all the cost of the kerosene lamps. During the year the number of gas lamps has been increased to 138, being an addition of 19 to the number over last year. The additional expense, together with the increased consumption of gas, make up the increased amount shown in this department. All gas consumed in the public buildings is also included.

Some fifteen kerosene lamps are still used. By the end of March it is expected the number of gas lamps will be increased to 150.

The cost of this department compared with the previous year is, 1870, \$6,771 84, 1871, \$7,516 52. Increase is \$744 68.

PRISONERS.—The amount to debit of this department is for taking care of prisoners at the work house, clothing them, and for their care while in temporary confinement at the guard house.

The amount is small compared with the benefits. This expense is unavoidable so long as crime and disorder exist.

The cost of this department compared with the previous year is, 1870, \$958 06, 1871, \$1,186 82. Increase is \$228 76.

PRINTING.—This department is debited with all cost of printing, advertising, stationary, blank books, check books, tax books, and everything appertaining to the outfit in that line necessary for business in the several city offices.

The cost of this department last year was charged under the head of "Miscellaneous," and was in 1870, \$2,747 65, 1871, \$1,901 87. Decrease is \$845 08.

MISCELLANEOUS.—The amount to debit of this account represents expenses not properly chargeable to any of the other divisions. The items are given in full in the general account published herewith.

EXPENSES, ARE THESE ITEMS, VIZ:

CITY ELECTION.—This charge is the portion of the cost paid after the beginning of the fiscal year, in accordance with an Act of the General Assembly at its session in 1870. The amount of cost of the election was \$1,008 45, most of which might have been saved had the election been held in accordance with previous law.

CONSTRUCTION.—This department is debited with the purchase of steam fire engine "Cape Fear," horses, equipment, and alterations in the Cape Fear engine house and the "Howard Relief" engine company's house. The debit to this account is \$6,523 55.

SANITARY PURPOSES.—The amounts debited to this account was paid for disinfecting the city, draining and keeping up rigid quarantine against the introduction of yellow fever from Charleston, S. C. Happily our city escaped. There is no doubt the precaution taken prevented a terrible epidemic. The long warm autumn gave great cause to fear the introduction of the fever. We were fortunate to escape the scourge which visited our sister city.

LOAN ACCOUNT.—This shows the payments made upon the amounts borrowed on the debt side. In addition is placed the sum paid to recover the bonds hypothecated by our agents in New York, the two items summing up the amount of \$68,704 25.

On the 1st of April, 1871, the last installment of the bonds issued to the Wilmington and Manchester Railroad Company became due and were paid. In addition \$1,500 of past due bonds were presented and paid, making a total of \$11,500. \$6,000 of these bonds have never been presented.
