U. S. SENATORSHIP.—Gen. Abbott has been refused the seat in the Senate which justly belonged to him, and Mr. Ransom, the Democratic candidate, installed in his place. Thus has a blow been dealt upon the Republican party in this State by its heretofore professed friends in the Senate.

TEACHERS ASSOCIATION PROPOSED.—It is proposed to hold, in compliance with the provisions of the school law and the offer of Dr. B. Sears, Commissioner of the Peabody Fund, a Teachers Association or Normal Class, of one month's duration, at the Williston school in this city, on Seventh street. Instruction in the best modes of teaching, and drill in the studies to be taught in our schools, will be free to all teachers or persons intending to teach who may choose to come. It is thought that much better preparation for primary teaching than they now possess may be secured by numbers, and that uniformity may be given to our system of schools.

This Association is at the request of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction and the County Board of Education, and is for all teachers in this part of the State. The term of commencing the classes will be May 13th.

## National Convention of Soldiers and Sailors.

The Cincinnati Commercial publishes the following card in reference to the Soldiers and Sailors' National Convention to meet in Washington on the 6th of May:

ROOMS OF THE SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' NATIONAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE. CLEVELAND, Ohio, April 17, 1872.

At a meeting of the Soldiers' and Sailors' National Executive Committee, to-day, the following temporary organization was made:

Private Dalzell, chairman, Ohio; private Young, vice president, Kansas; private Tilton, secretary, Pennsylvania; private Dardine, West Virginia; private Davis, New York; private Reece, New Jersey; private Eaton, New York; private Brown, Indiana; private Wells, Minnesota; private Wood, California; private Graves, Massachusetts; private Jones, Delaware; private Young, Illinois; private Smith, Missouri; private Wilson, Wisconsin; private Bell, Connecticut; private Ashfield, District of Columbia.

Over 3,000 letters were received from soldiers in every State in the Union, heartily endorsing the holding of a National Soldiers' and Sailors' Convention, at Washington, D. C., May 6, 1872. From the earnestness of these letters, it is expected that the attendance of soldiers and sailors from every State will be large.

Arrangements are being made with the Associated Press, East and West, to publish the call for the convention. The objects of the convention can not be disclosed yet, but when announced, after the convention, will reveal the most startling political sensation of the nineteenth century. The following brief call is put forth to-day:

SOLDIERS: The hour to strike for our rights has come. Generals, the Irish element, the negro element, the German element, and all other elements have very properly their full share of public offices. We, two millions American voters, have not one office! This is all wrong. Our bounties have not yet been equalized, our back pensions are in many cases not allowed, and other wrongs have been done the rank and file. It is our own fault. We have the power, if we organize, to do all these things. This is the call of all the petitions circulated by the National Soldiers' and Sailors' Convention, May 6, 1872. Every soldier and sailor should make some pecuniary sacrifice and attend the National Convention at Washington City, in which we have any part or lot.
