· What the Egures Say.

From the Charlotte Observer. One of our townsmen has taken a curious way to find out who is to be our next President, and the result of his investigation proved entirely satisfactory. He says that figures wont lie, and figures point directly to Tilden's election; and this is how it's done: Number each letter according to its position in the Alphabet, A being one and Z twenty-six. Add up the numbers corresponding to the letters in the names. The letters in the names S. Tilden and T. Hendricks and the result is 197. Add the numbers of the letters in the names of R. Hayes and W. Wheeler and you get 175. The entire electoral vote is 369, consequently 185 is necessary to a choice. Now the names of the Republican candidates lack 10 of furnishing the requisite number, while those of S. Tilden and T. Hendricks give 197, being 12 over the number necessary to a choice. Carrying it a little further, 197 being greater than 175 by 22, or a little over 10 per cent., the Democratic majority will be 10 per cent. of the entire vote. This settles it.
