TILDEN IN NEW YORK. FINEST POLITICAL DISPLAY EVER WITNESSED IN THE

METROPOLIS.

Grand Outpouring of the Democracy-Sixty Thousand in Line-Governor Tilden Reviews the Procession at 10 O'clock in the Morning. Associated Press Telegram.

NEW YORK, Oct. 27 .- Last night's political display was the most imposing ever witnessed in this city. There were fully 60,000 in line. The Democratic working-men, regardless of local differences, were represented by their clubs. The demonstration commonced at 71 o'clock, and at 1 o'clock this morning Gov. Tilden was still in position in front of the Everett House, reviewing the procession. There were hundreds of curious devices representing traditions of the past and hopes for the future.

THE GRAND CONSPIRACY.

Washington, October 24 .- The evi-dences of the deep-seated conspiracy to wrest certain of the Southern States from the Democratic party are daily multiplying. The outrage mill has been set, to work again, and the same old falsehoods concerning Mississippi, Louisiana and South Carolina are now being furnished to the partisan press with the request to give them the greatest prominence. This is all prel liminary to throwing troops into those, States to be put under the control of the radical United States marshals. It is notorious that in North Carolina the utmost quiet has prevailed, and the canvass has been conducted with the greatest good feeling on both sides.

Only a few days since a letter was received at the bureau here from the chairman of the Republican State committee, which was given entirely to a discussion of the campaign, and yet did not hint one word of any trouble or anticipated disorder in the whole State. But in order to secure some pretext for sending troops into that State the administration is seattering broadcast over the North stories of imaginary outrages. The New York Tribune, which ought to be capable of better things, is foremost in the work of villification and mendacity. . The action of the administration is a confession that Hayes and Wheeler can only be elected by overrunning the Southern Stutes with armed soldiery and "surrounding the ballot boxes with bayonets.


The Advance says Col. Kenan has made an active canvass, but looks fresh and hearty. He will labor in this section until the day of election.
