### NORTHERN POLITICAL NEWS.

**Betting in Favor of Tilden Continues—Riot in New Jersey.**  
Associated Press Telegrams.  
NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—While the colored clubs from Jersey City were returning home after the Republican parade disbanded last night a row occurred near DeBoissieres street ferry. The negroes used pistols and dirk knives. Wm. J. Merriman was stabbed in the left breast. The wound may prove fatal. Thos. J. Fisher was shot in the left leg; James Morton was shot in the left breast and two others were slightly wounded. None of the colored men are known to be injured nor were any of their number arrested.

Among the pools last night the general result was in favor of Tilden by \$3,000 to \$2,000, \$300 to \$240 and \$150 to \$125. On New York for Tilden \$100 to \$37; \$1,000 even is bet on Tilden getting 20,000 majority in the State; \$100 to \$50 is bet that Tilden's majority in New Jersey will not reach \$7,000.

### WHAT THEY ARE UP TO.

**A Rumor of Troops for North Carolina.**

RICHMOND, VA., Nov. 2.—I learn there is rumor in Washington that troops now massed at Columbia, South Carolina, may be thrown into your state, some twenty-four hours previous to Tuesday's election. It's to intimidate. Let our people stand firm, and let this outrage if perpetrated, only stimulate them to an earnest determination to elect Tilden and Vance.

### Taking Possession.

**Gets a Rapping from an Ex-Republican—Delicate Reference to an Alleged Forgery.**

Still further, you know that in the Rountree matter you are charged with forgery. You know when you went to Wilmington you carried a letter from an attorney in Newbern to an attorney in Wilmington, in which it was stated that you might be prosecuted for forgery, and that you presented this letter to the attorney in Wilmington, and he promised to defend you if necessary. (By way of parenthesis, I can prove that you did bear the letter above referred to.) I will here state to the public that I now appear in print for the first time since 1864, and only now in discharge of a painful duty that I owe to the public, in exposing this man who has placed himself before the public for official honors, for I have not one particle of unkind feeling towards Mr. Canaday or his personal and political friends. Being an old line Whig, and conscientiously opposed to the late civil war, it was natural that I should fall into the Republican ranks when the party was formed in the State. I continued to act with this party until quite recently, in all things, except the Constitutional Amendments, but after an honest, an earnest discussion with other Republicans, a number of us have left the party, because we found that our hands were tied by terribly corrupt official rings, and the only remedy left us was to abandon our old political associates. I am entirely unknown in Wilmington to any person except Judge Cantwell.
