Correction.

Mr. Henry Nutt requests us to make a correction or two in our report of the proceedings of the Scientific and Historical Society meeting, last Monday night. We do so with pleasure. Mr. Nutt says that he did not say there was obscurity as to the date of the opening of New Inlet. That inlet was formed'in September, 1761. Another place wherein he is incorrectly reported was where we made him to be in doubt as to the obstructions placed in the river during the Revolutionary War. These were not particularly for the purpose of keeping out Sir Peter Parker's fleet, for the reason that they had been put there the year before to protect the port from invasion generally. As to the Old Town settlement from New England, which the Barbadoes colonists found, there is some obscurity as to its precise date. This colony, however, was not at the mouth of the river. as
