DUPONT LIKELY TO GET OUT

Powder Trust Senator in the Lime Light

Head of Republican Campaign Speakers' Bureau May Resign—President Wants Him Out It is Claimed—Secretary Loeb Admits the Resignation is Expected, But for Once Won't Talk Much.

Washington, Sept. 25.—Secretary Loeb admitted today that "Dupont's resignation is expected." T. Coleman Dupont is the Republican National Committeeman, of Delaware, and head of the Republican campaign speakers' bureau. It is stated that Roosevelt requested Dupont's elimination on account of his relationship with the powder trust. Loeb would not confirm the report, however.

Paris, France, Sept. 25.—The police claim the discovery of a plot to assassinate King Alfonso, of Spain, tomorrow at Biarritz, when he passes through en route to Paris. Several men have been arrested.

A STRANGE CASE.

Well-Known Chicago Man Unconscious Almost a Year.
Chicago, Sept. 25.—Leslie Carter, one of the best known business men of Chicago, died this morning. He had been unconscious since November 9th, last year, when he was asphyxiated by gas. He was the former husband of Mrs. Leslie Carter, the well-known actress.

Mauretania Delayed.

New York, Sept. 25.—The Mauretania, which left the dock Wednesday, is tied up at Gravesend Bay. The dense fog would imperil the big liner in the Ambrose channel.

Street Car Collision.

New York, Sept. 25.—In a rear end collision between two trolley cars at Flushing Meadows, seven persons were injured this morning. The fog was thick, and the motorman on the rear car could not see the car ahead. Both cars were well filled with passengers.

BIG WRECK REPORTED.

25 People Said to Have Been Killed on Northern Pacific.
Helena, Mont., Sept. 25.—A special train from Livingston says a passenger train on the Northern Pacific collided with a freight this morning and 25 persons were killed.

A BIG VICTORY

Swept Things Yesterday in New Hanover County—A Great Day's Work for Progress and Prosperity—Had Big Majority Over Total Vote Registered.

When the polls closed yesterday afternoon at 6:06 o'clock victory in no uncertain way has been registered for the good roads bond issue. A big majority of the voters had remained loyal to Wilmington and the county and cast their ballots for progress and prosperity. Every ward in the city, save the First, and every precinct in the country was carried by the bond issue, the majority in each being over the vote registered. The First only missed a majority by eleven votes. The majority was 370 out of a total registration of 1,546. It was a big victory and it will permit the work of good roads to continue in this county.

As stated in The Dispatch yesterday afternoon the bond issue only lacked 88 votes of winning at 3 o'clock and, as predicted in the same columns, those 88 were quickly made up and more obtained. The three remaining hours yesterday witnessed the casting of many more votes for the good roads.

ENTERS INTO REST.

Mr. W. S. Hewlett Passed Away Last Night—Funeral Tomorrow Morning.
Friends in the city will deeply regret to learn of the death of Mr. William S. Hewlett, who passed away last night at his home in this city, No. 303 South Fifth street, after a lingering illness with paralysis, which had confined him to his home for the past nineteen months. Mr. Hewlett was in the 65th year of his age, having been born on Masonboro Sound. The deceased spent practically his entire life in this city.

He was born at Masonboro Sound, but came to Wilmington early in life. When the Civil War broke out he responded promptly and gallantly to the call of his beloved Southland and fought nobly for its honor and to its glory. For 31 years he was employed by one firm, that of Mitchell & Huggins, succeeded by the B. F. Mitchell Company, and then went to work for the J. C. Stevenson Company, which he served faithfully until stricken with paralysis about 19 months ago. He was a splendid type of man, was a true friend and a fine companion.

Mr. Hewlett married a daughter of old Wilmington and there are now surviving to mourn their loss, his devoted wife, three sons and six daughters, all of whom have the sympathy of many friends in their bereavement. The children are Mr. R. A. Hewlett, of Portland, Oregon; Mr. J. Henry Hewlett, of Wilmington; and Mr. Benjamin Hewlett, of Milwaukee, Wis.; Mrs. D. T. Meade, of Sumter, S. C.; Mrs. N. P. Brandt, of St. Augustine, Fla.; Mrs. S. A. Greelish, and Miss Louise Hewlett, of Wilmington; and Mrs. Claudia Henderson, of Holyoke, N. Y., and Mrs. Nat Narder, of West Virginia.

The funeral will be held at the residence tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock, thence to Masonboro Sound, where the interment will be made in the Hewlett family burying ground.

COURT CALENDAR

FIX TODAY

Three Weeks of Court Starts Monday

First Will Be a One Day Drawing for Criminal Cases—Fort. When Civil Actions and Cases Set for Trial Today—Phares vs. Clarendon Waterworks Co. the First for Trial—The Entire Calendar.

Commencing Monday there will be three weeks of Superior Court for New Hanover county, Judge C. W. Lyon presiding, and it will be divided into two terms. The first week will be a term for the trial of criminal cases only, while the next fortnight will be for the hearing of civil actions. Relative to the latter the bar of the county met this morning at the court house to arrange the calendar. Different cases were discussed and then a committee of three, composed of Walter P. Gafford, Esq., J. W. Little Esq., and G. D. Weeks, Esq., was appointed to definitely set the cases. The committee worked zealously and promptly in the matter and arranged both the trial and motion calendars. Cases were set for each day of the term, save for Friday and Saturday, of the second week. They are for consideration of the motion docket and other matters. A large number of cases were set for trial, but, of course, it is not expected to try anywhere near all of them. In fact, a big majority will go over. On the docket of the Superior Court there are now over four hundred civil suits.

The very interesting and important action of G. D. Phares vs. the Clarendon Waterworks Company is the first case set for trial. Other interesting cases that appear on the docket are those of N. M. McEachern, administrator, vs. the Atlantic Coast Line railroad, an action brought for damages on account of the death of Mr. Thomas Oldham; Little vs. the City of Wilmington, two actions on account of the death of a lad, who was run over by a city cart; Burriss vs. the City of Wilmington, suit for damages resulting from an accident to the plaintiff, and Lillycrop vs. the Woodmen of the World, which involves insurance money over the suicide of the young member picture showman in Wilmington about two years ago.
