## SPLENDID IDEA

### Interesting Memorial That May be Established in City of Edinburg to the Late King Edward.

London, Sept. 7.—While hundreds of suggestions (many of them idiotic) are pouring into the Mansion House in regard to the form to be taken by London's memorial to King Edward, the City of Edinburg has put forward one which is likely to receive enthusiastic support. The suggestion which it is whispered, originated with Lord Roseberry, is that the ancient Stuart Palace of Holyrood so closely associated with the unhappy Mary Queen of Scots should be completely restored and made habitable. Lord Roseberry is said to have approached King George on the subject, and there is every reason to believe that both the King and Queen would be willing to spend a week every year in Edinburg and hold a Court or a ball in this interesting old Palace if it were properly restored.

A representative committee with Lord Roseberry at its head has already been formed and the Edinburg society women are already talking breathlessly of brilliant Court functions. Queen Victoria had a horror of Holyrood Palace which is said to contain in one of its enormously thick walls the body of an infant who should by right have ascended the British throne. A lady-in-waiting, who mentioned the legend to the old Queen received very severe snubbing and was told never to mention the subject again, while one of the officials who show visitors round the Palace was promptly dismissed when it was found that he had been repeating the story.

The alternative memorial scheme is the restoration of another Scottish Palace, Linlithgow, but it is acutely certain that the Holyrood scheme will be adopted. A very large sum will be required to make the Palace sanitary and to light and furnish it in Royal style, but Edinburg contains many wealthy citizens and no difficulty is anticipated in raising the sum required. The Scottish people are delighted at King George's decision to remain two months at Balmoral. He likes the place as much as his father disliked it, and there will be a succession of intimate friends staying at the Castle for the shooting and the fishing. King George's nearest neighbors are Admiral Beatty who married the daughter of Marshall Field and Mr. Sigismund Neumann the South African magnate. The former will often be a guest at Balmoral and Society folk are anxiously waiting to see if Mr. Neumann will also be favored. It is an open secret that King George did not like the financiers who surrounded his father and that only very exceptional circumstances have induced him to remain on good terms with Sir Ernest Cassel.

### Object to Slaughter of Lions.

According to some of the farmers of East Africa, the lion should be protected as a useful animal, notwithstanding the fact that once in a while he kills a man. The lion, they maintain, is a great destroyer of noxious herbivorous animals, such as zebras and antelopes, which are a scourge to the fields. In one district they say no fewer than 46 lions have recently been killed by hunters, and they estimate that this represents the saving of 35,000 to 40,000 zebras and antelopes, which would otherwise have fallen a prey to the lions that have been destroyed. Of course, the hunters shoot zebras and antelopes, but this fact, they think, does not counterbalance the destruction of those animals that would have been effected by the slain lions.

### Curiosities of Smell.

No substance that refuses to dissolve in water has an odor. It is the actual substance itself, floating in particles in the air, that appeals to the nose, and not simply a vibration of the air, as in the case of light and sound. The damper a thing is the more powerful the odor it gives off. A pleasant proof of the fact can be had by walking in a garden after rain. There is no end to the curiosities of smell. If, for instance, the vapor of a liquid that smells, and not the liquid in the mass itself, if eau de cologne be poured into the nostril, the nose refuses to recognize any odor there at all.
