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THE WHITE TEACHERS

Of the County Schools held the Concluding Session of the Fall Term Today at the Office of County Superintendent of Education—Talk of the Morning Was Delivered by Miss Sallie O. Edwards.

The final fall meeting of the New Hanover County White Teachers Association was held today at the office of Professor Washington Catlett, County Superintendent of Superintendent of Education. Practically all the members of the association attended the meeting, only two failing to answer the roll call. The feature address of the morning was made by Miss Sallie O. Edwards, who has charge of Masonboro School, Number Four. Miss Edwards discussed the science of teaching and reading. Her talk proved thoroughly entertaining. At the conclusion of her remarks there was general discussion of the subject. It was decided to have the next meeting of the Association the final Saturday in January. The teachers were notified today that the county schools will close for the fall term on Friday December 23rd, and will re-open for the spring work Tuesday, January 3rd.

The reference was made to the High school, the splendid annex having been delivered to the educational authorities yesterday. It is the intention in future to have the High school regarded as a county institution. Efforts will be made to have pupils who live in the rural districts take advantage of the superior facilities afforded by the higher institution after they have completed the courses in the preparatory schools.
