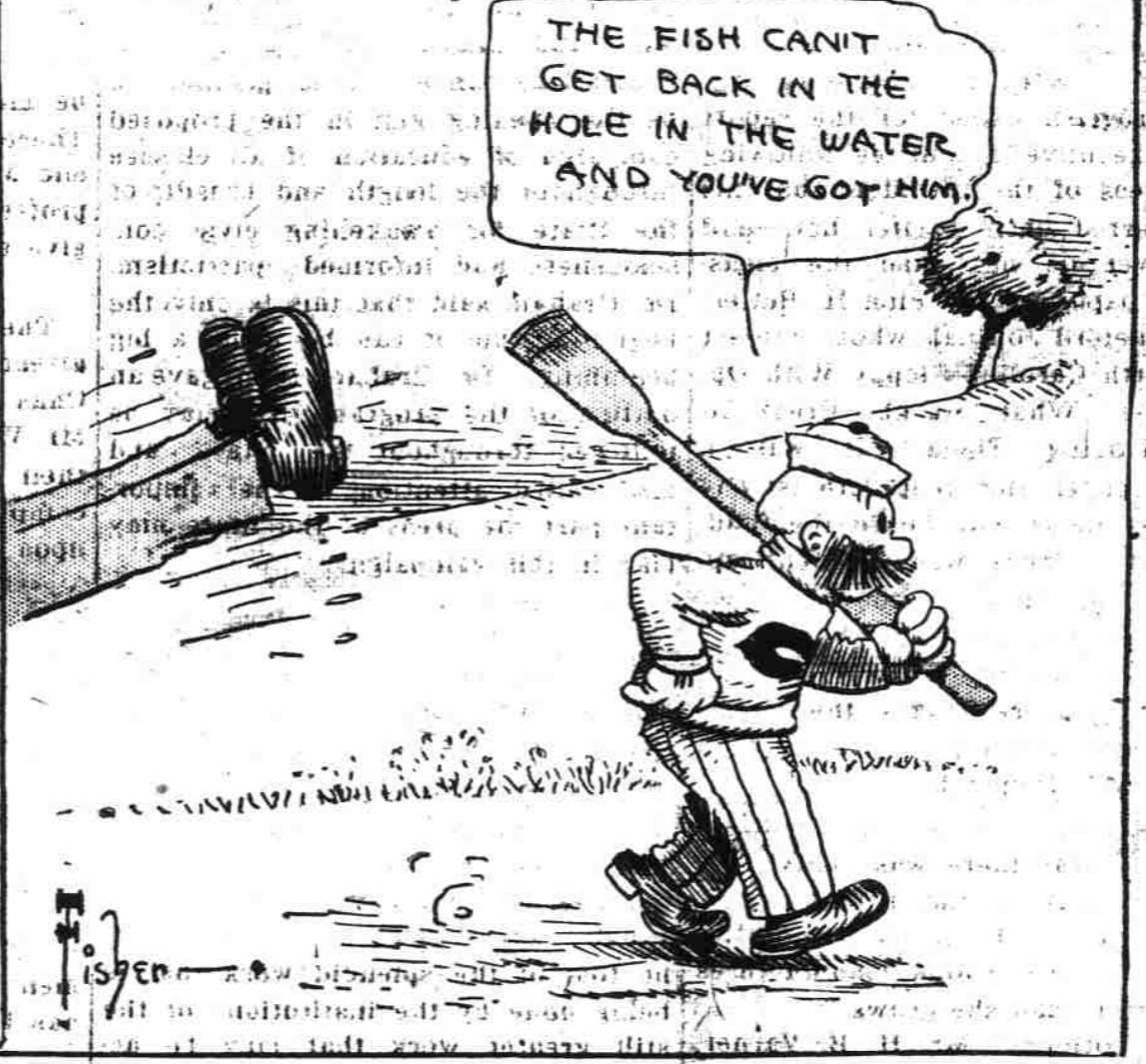
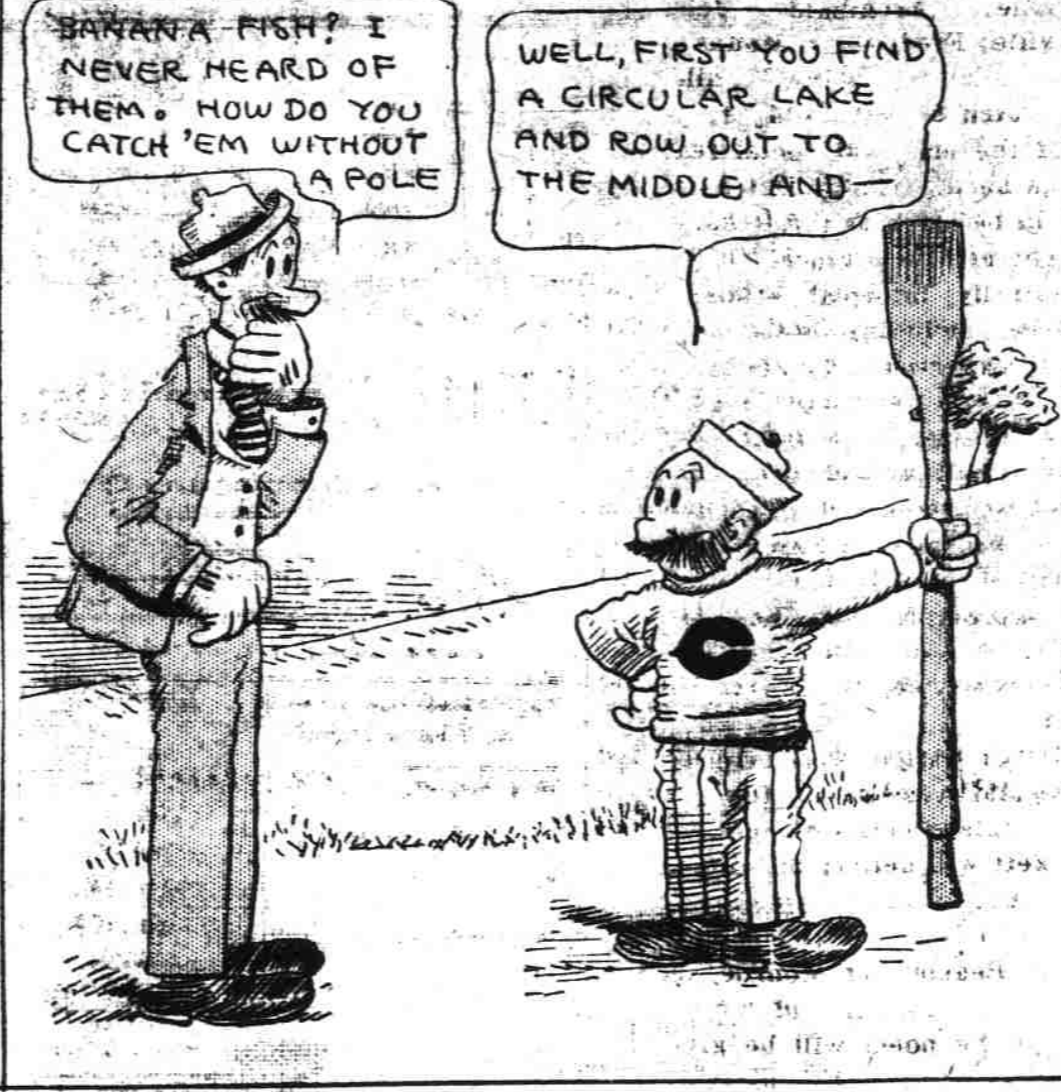
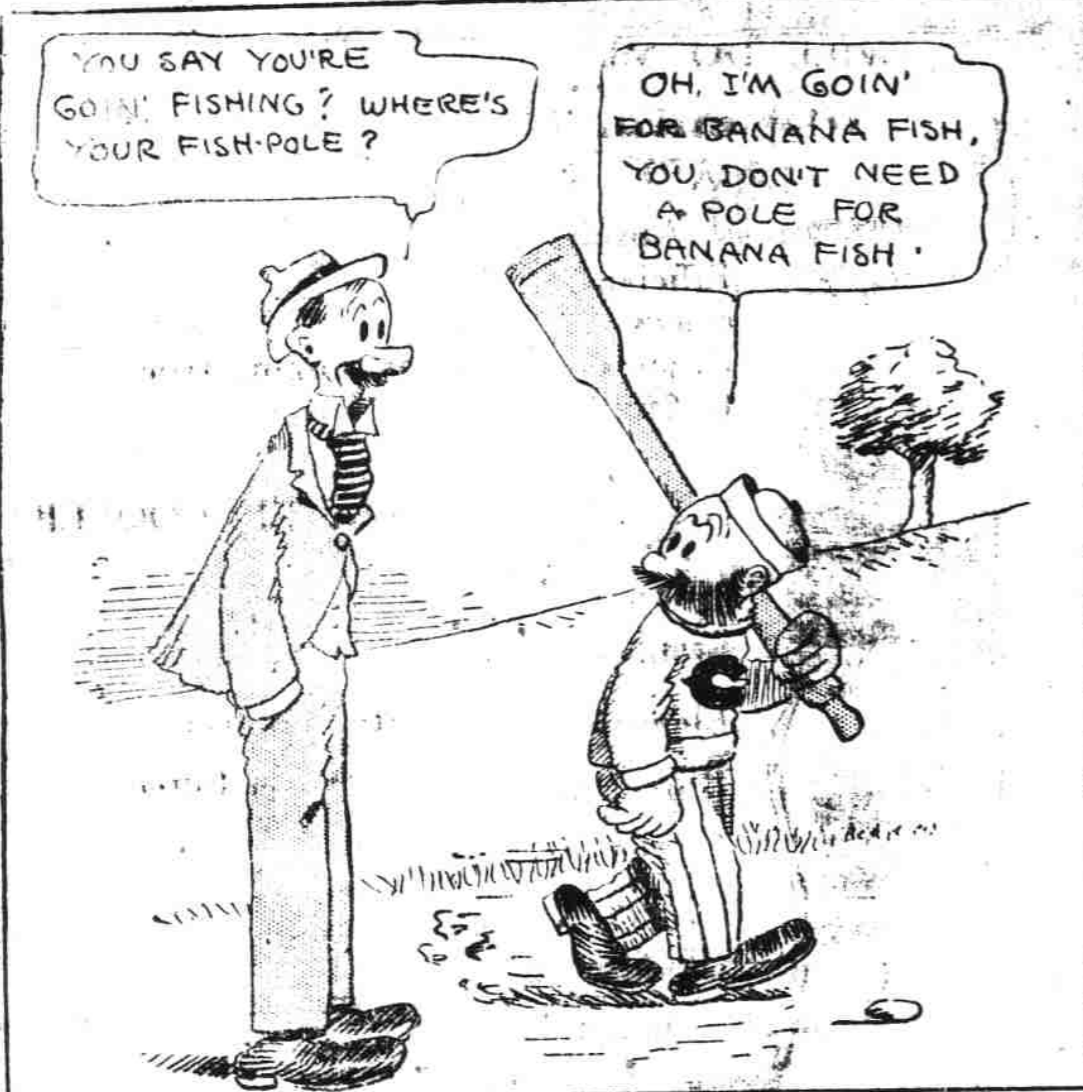

**PICKS MORAN TO WIN.**  
 New York Promoter Predicts Downfall of Black Champion.  
 New York, June 24.—"Billy" Gibson, New York's leading promoter of boxing clubs, picks Frank Moran, the Pittsburg white, to beat Jack Johnson, when they meet in a twenty-round fight in Paris next Saturday night. Gibson bases his opinion on Johnson's physical condition. He has received private information from Paris that the negro has taken off a lot of weight, but may not possess the strength and stamina that enabled him to whip Jeffries at Reno.

"There is no betting on the fight here," said Gibson today, "but I learn that Johnson is a 10 to 4 favorite in Paris. If I could spare the time to cross the ocean I would have a big bet on Moran simply as a good gambling proposition. I never have believed that in a heavyweight fight odds of 2 to 1 or better should be allowed to go begging."  
 "Over here we cannot learn the negro's true condition except from hearsay. If he is as fit as when he beat Jeffries, Moran will have a hard time of it; but, honestly, I think Moran will turn the trick; also the fight will be on the level."  
 "A victory over Johnson means a fortune for Moran. He will become a wonderful drawing card all over the world, and he can earn a million before taking part in another battle. It was shrewd judgment to get this match with Johnson, for Moran has the chance of a lifetime. If he beats the negro he'll be the most popular champion since the days of John L. Sullivan."
