

NOT TO GIVE UP PROTECTORATE

Episcopal Council Decides Such About The Negroes—Lively Debate

(Special to The Dispatch.)
Kinston, N. C., May 23.—Negro clergymen before the council of the Episcopal Diocese of East Carolina here today protested against divestment of the races in the church in debate, following upon a favorable report by a committee. The report was voted down and a substitute resolution, saying that the time was not yet ripe, but that separation should be the future of the church, was adopted. The negro ministers declared no benefit could accrue to their race.

Deputies to the general convention were appointed as follows:

The following alternates were selected: Rev. C. A. Ashby, of Elizabeth City; Rev. F. F. Huske, of New Bern; Rev. T. P. Noe, of Wilmington; Rev. J. S. Moody, of Fayetteville; R. W. Smith, of Hertford; E. K. Blafop, of New Bern; Theodore Partrick, Jr., of Clinton, and R. R. Cotten.

A motion by Rev. C. A. Ashby to abolish the office of archdeacon is expected to cause a lively tilt, this afternoon when the committee reports on it.

Reports to the council show substantial gains in all lines of the diocesan work in the past year.

WOULD HAVE COMMISSION RESCIND ORDER

of Wilmington and southbound from New York into Wilmington, the absence of which is a matter of deep concern to the entire territory between Wilmington and Goldsboro, and in a subject which Wilmington has had up with the Atlantic Coast Line officials for years. The service in contemplation would provide through sleeping cars from Wilmington to New York and from New York to Wilmington, intermediate points receiving the same character of service. The schedule would be to leave Wilmington about 9 o'clock p. m., and arrive at Wilmington about 8 o'clock a. m., thus providing two morning trains into Wilmington for the territory between Goldsboro and Wilmington, and two evening trains out of Wilmington. This schedule would serve all the section between Goldsboro and Wilmington, and I am informed that prominent citizens of Goldsboro are very much in favor of this service. Under present conditions there is no northbound sleeping car service beyond Washington for territory between Wilmington and Goldsboro, and returning no sleeping car facilities north of Washington, involving a change both ways at Washington, which is attended by a great deal of annoyance. The proposed through service would provide cars through to New York and cars out from New York, and thereby put this territory on a parity with the service accorded points further south, such as Charleston, etc. There is strong reason to believe that this service will be inaugurated if trains Nos. 90 and 91 are not resorted.

"Every tax on the revenues of a public carrier is so much impairment of its ability to perform public service, and public interest demands that no unnecessary tax shall be laid as it operates either directly or indirectly to restrict legitimate and needed service. The through service under discussion is a Federal question, but if you require the operation of an unprofitable train into and out of Wilmington, to serve an indefensibly restricted section, you cannot escape the conclusion that the tendency, if not the effect, will be to imperil our chances for a through service, and since the question of equity is co-extensive with State and Federal authority, in a case of this sort local and general public interests are inseparable.

"I had personal knowledge of the character of travel on trains Nos. 90 and 91 when they were formerly operated, and am prepared to testify that I rarely saw a passenger on the train after it passed Warsaw, Wilmington bound. Moreover, the train was frequently late and the practice was for Wilmington passengers to get off at Goldsboro and come down on the morning train. On the return train no local territory this side of War-

saw served because of the unearthy hours, and since the annulment of these trains there has been no change in local conditions justifying the expectation of a larger patronage and a more needed service.
"Wilmington would not needlessly oppose any interest of Goldsboro or any other neighboring point, and we contend that inasmuch as the restoration of trains Nos. 90 and 91 would most certainly defeat securing the through service referred to, that the better served by dispensing with strictly local trains and uniting on the larger question of a through service, which would at the same time incidentally supply a valuable local service.

"In view of these considerations the Commission is respectfully requested to rescind its action in this case.

Notice is hereby given that the Council of the City of Wilmington by an ordinance duly adopted on the 26th day of April, called and ordered to be held in the City of Wilmington on Saturday, the 3rd day of June, 1916, at special election for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of said City an ordinance adopted by said Council on the 26th day of April, 1916, by which ordinance the tax ordinance of said City for the fiscal year ending May 31st, 1917, and previously adopted by said Council is amended, said amending ordinance fixing the total tax rate for said City for said fiscal year at \$1.85 upon the one hundred dollars property valuation and authorizing said Council to levy and collect as a part of the total rate aforesaid a special tax of 10c on the one hundred dollars property valuation, or so much thereof as may be necessary for the purpose of improving and extending the water-works system of said City, the purchase of additional fire fighting apparatus for the Fire Department of said City, the improvement of Princess street in said City and the establishment of an industrial or manufacturing suburb in said City.
By said amending ordinance the propositions to improve said water-works system and purchase for said Fire Department additional apparatus, the improvement of Princess street and the establishment of said industrial or manufacturing suburb are provided to be voted upon separately.
