Episcopal Council Decides Such About The Negroes-Lively Debate

(Special to The Dispatch.) Kinston, N. C., May 23.—Negro clergymen before the council of the Episcopal Diocese of East Carolina here today protested against divorcement of the races in the church in debate, following upon a favorable report by a committee. The report was voted down and a substitute resolvition, saying that the time was not yet ripe, but that separation should be the future of the church, was adopted. The negro ministers declared no benefit could accrue to their race.
