## TO INSPECT THE HARBOR OF REFUGE

(Special to The Dispatch.)

New Bern, N. C., Sept. 1.—Col. W. V. Judson, of Baltimore, division engineer for the U. S. Engineering Department; Captain C. S. Ridley, of Wilmington, District Engineer, and Engineer H. T. Paterson, of this city, left New Bern yesterday morning en route to Morehead City, from which place they will go over to the Harbor of Refuge and make an inspection of the work now being done there.

Work of erecting the breakwater at that place is said to be progressing rapidly and the contractors are trying to break all previous records made during the summer months.

A record-breaking sale of tobacco was made on the local market today, more than one hundred thousand pounds of the weed being brought in this morning and placed on the floors of the local warehouse and disposed of during the day.

The prices, as a whole, paid for the tobacco were high, averaging in the neighborhood of 20 cents, and with some of it selling as high as 40 cents a pound.

The growers in this section are losing no time in getting the weed on the market and at the present rate practically all of it will have been disposed of within the course of four or five weeks longer.
