Doctors Hope to Save Mr. Tallafiero's Arm—Whitaker Still Confined.

The condition of Mr. John Tallafiero, who was shot and seriously wounded by Raymond Whitaker, Tuesday morning near Ivanhoe, shows improvement, according to a report from the James Walker Memorial Hospital this morning. The arm that was injured by the bullet has not been amputated as yet and the doctors are of the opinion that this will not be necessary unless complications set in. Young Whitaker is still confined in the county jail pending a hearing on a charge of assault with intent to kill. Because an effort is being made to avoid amputation of Mr. Tallafiero's arm the hearing cannot be had in the near future as much time will necessarily elapse before the patient can be discharged from the institution at which he is being treated.
