

FIRST SESSIONS WERE INTERESTING

Most Popular Actress In The Country at Academy of Music Evening of Nov. 23rd.

Raleigh, Nov. 2.—The Daughters of the American Revolution are in session here and the first sessions yesterday were attended by a remarkably large number.

At the opening session the State regent, Miss Lida Rodman, announced that she must retire after this convention. Illness has been responsible for her decision. She made no presidential address yesterday.

Judge R. W. Winston, representing Governor Craig, welcomed the visitors on behalf of the State. Mayor James I. Johnson spoke for the city and then words of greetings came from men and women.

Mrs. S. Bailey Williamson spoke for the Raleigh chapter and Mrs. W. O. Spencer developed the Woodrow Wilson sentiment when she lauded the President so handsomely. Mrs. Spencer spoke by way of response to the welcome. Then Dr. D. H. Hill, Miss Mary Hilliard Hinton, R. D. W. Connor, Mrs. Eugene Little, Mrs. S. W. Brewer, Mrs. T. W. Lingle, Mrs. James A. Briggs and Mrs. Clarence Johnson gave their greetings.

Mrs. Lingle, of Davidson, spoke for the Federation of Women's Clubs, and Mrs. Little, for the Daughters of the Confederacy. The others are Raleigh people and spoke for their respective organizations.

The morning session had an unusual musical enjoyment in the vocal solo and violin accompaniment, by Miss Lyons of the Blind Institute. She played and sang "A Perfect Day," and showed as fine a voice as she plays an instrument. Miss Thompson sang in the afternoon.

At this meeting the work preliminary to the big day was done by Mrs. John F. Willy, of Durham, called the roll of the delegates and Mrs. Lindsay Patterson read the "Report of Fort Dobbs." Mrs. Carey K. Dufey gave a 5 o'clock tea and last evening, Miss Helen Marie Day, of Meredith's music faculty, gave a musicale at the Governor's Mansion. Many artists of the city took part in the event.

Mrs. T. S. Morrison, of Asheville, is credited by Miss Rodman with splendid assistance as vice-regent. For the organization itself the president can report progress. New chapters have been established in Hendersonville, High Point, King's Mountain and one is in the formation at Monroe, but is not ready for report yet.

HUGHES BACK TO END CAMPAIGN IN NEW YORK

Buffalo, Nov. 2.—Charles Evans Hughes came back to his home State today to wind up his Presidential campaign. His program carries him to central New York, to make an address at Albany tonight.

MAXTON SCHOOLS OPENED MONDAY

Exceptionally Large Enrollments and Patrons Looking Forward Good Work.

Maxton, N. C., Nov. 2.—Representatives of the Woman's Civic League are circulating a petition asking the town commissioners for an appropriation of \$600 to provide a Rest Room and Library for the convenience of visiting ladies and children.

The formal opening of Maxton's Graded School in the new \$20,000 school building took place Monday with the following program:

Organization of Parents' and Teachers' Co-operative Club. The exercises were all interesting and well rendered. Besides the address, inspiring talks were made by Dr. Hill and Supt. J. R. Poole. This new building is one of the nicest and best equipped in the county. It is modern in every respect, has a large auditorium. The acoustics are perfect. It is steam heated throughout.

Prof. Woltz is assisted by a corps of six competent and enthusiastic teachers and expects in the near future to institute departments of manual training and domestic science. The people of Maxton are justly proud of their new building and are to be congratulated on the work that has been done.

At Carolina College the rooms are full. President Mercer has a fine crowd of girls and says that the co-operative club plan is likely to become a permanent feature.

This afternoon there will be a meeting of the trustees and at 6 o'clock dinner will be served for the business men of the town.

GOVERNOR CRAIG CONGRATULATED VA.

In a Message to The Old Dominion Expresses Hope That Blessings Follow.

Raleigh, Nov. 2.—Governor Craig today congratulated the Commonwealth of Virginia upon its abolition of the liquor traffic, and prophesies that it will "bring inestimable benefits there, as it has done in North Carolina."
