### SEALS GO ON SALE

#### Ladies Canvassing City Selling Red Cross Seals.

Actual canvass of the city for the purpose of selling Red Cross stamps was begun by members of the Wilmington Red Cross Society this morning and the ladies who refuse to take no for an answer are experiencing little difficulty in disposing of the seals that will decorate hundreds of thousands of letters and packages between the present time and the Christmas season.

The society has set their goal for this year above the 100,000 mark and are confident that it can be attained. Because they expect and hope to dispose of more seals this season than in the past an early start has been made and the work will be kept up until the last day of the Yuletide season.

The city has been divided and the ladies are working in pairs. In addition a team will occupy the lobby in the Postoffice, in all probability, and persons mailing packages will have to explain why Red Cross seals should not adorn every letter or parcel post or purchase liberally of the seals.

The money derived from the sale of the seals will be used in promoting the work of exterminating tuberculosis or curtailing its ravages as much as possible.

### TRUCK TURNED TURTLE

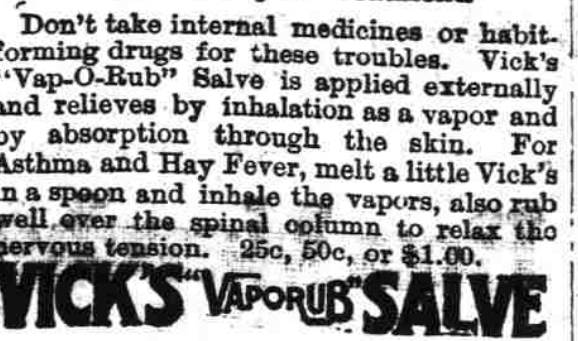
#### Collided With Surry at Winter Park Last Night.
