Washington, Nov. 18.—Awards for the contract of 14 of the torpedo boat destroyers authorized by the last naval appropriations bill were announced today. The Fore Shipbuilding Corporation, of Quincy, Mass., will construct eight and the Union Iron Works, of San Francisco, six vessels. Contracts now have been let for 18 of the 20 vessel authorized.
