ROTATION BILL PRESENTED IN THE HOUSE TODAY.

he minority reports that the bills were set as special order for next Thursday. New bills were introduced as follows:

Pegram—Provide a general law for the organization and government of towns and cities under the operation of the constitutional amendments.

Matheson—Amend the law as to the Mooresville graded school.

Grant, of Onslow—Repeal a 1899 law relative to the town of Swansboro.

Shaw—Fix the pay of jurors and special veniremen in Scotland county.

Hovle (by request)—Permit high school students to attend school in adjoining counties.

Winborne—Amend certain sections of the Revisal of 1908.

Prevette—Require all fertilizer companies to use lime as fillers in this State.

Oliver—Repeal a 1917 act relative to certain work by commissioners of Robeson county.

Brummett—Increase the efficiency of the care of tubercular patients; increase pensions and levy special tax therefor.

Sellars—Amend the private laws of 1913 relative to levying and collecting special taxes.

Representative Gardner offered a bill to substitute for one by Hicks that Gardner alleged restored the treasurer's office for Avery and named a commission that would appoint Hicks to the place. Gardner's bill puts the treasurer's work in the sheriff's office.

The House launched upon a long argument on the bill for the creation of a State boiler inspector at a salary of \$1,800 per year to work under the Department of Labor. A motion by Mr. Butts to table the bill was lost and then Representatives Dalton, Pharr, Grant, of New Hanover, and Pritchard, Gardner, Russell and others favored the bill. Price, of Union; Ray, of Chatham, and others joined Butts and Kernodie in opposition to the bill.

All amendments were voted down, including one by King to reduce the fee for inspection from \$5 to \$3. Then the bill passed both readings and was sent to the Senate.

Senate Thursday.

Rev. M. Bradshaw, of the Edenton Street Methodist Church, offered the prayer for the opening of the Senate today at 11 o'clock.

The Senate committee on public health returned an unfavorable report on the open formula secret remedy bill that was argued most strenuously more than a week ago.

Cramer—Provide elevators for the State capitol building.

Gough—Amend section 2092, Revisal of 1905.

McCain—Provide for fire protection of State institutions and the safeguarding of the inmates.

Holderness—Amend the law as to intimidating witnesses and jurors.

Joyce—Relieve individuals in trade; amend the law as to peddlers license tax.

Holderness—Relating to the enticing of labor.

Warren—Require publication of statements of accounts by drainage commissioners.

Cramer—Amend sections 3 and 17, public laws of 1907.

Oates—Encourage the enlargement of the State sanitarium for tubercular patients; permit the erection of a bronze statue of John H. Mills, founder of the State and Baptist orphanage work in the State, in Nash Square, Raleigh; relative to the cancellation of mortgages and deeds of trust.

Williams—Amend the Yadkin county road law already passed at this session.

Senator Scales was granted a leave of absence until Saturday.

A flood of petitions came in from many sections of the State urging the passage of the Anti-Saloon League legislation amending the prohibition law.

The Senate launched upon a long argument on the bill by Senator Gray, of Forsyth, to increase the penalties for pistol-toting. Senator Brenner urged that the penalties be made drastic enough to discourage this offense.

among negroes. An amendment by Senator Long, of Alamance, to cut the minimum fine for the first offense to \$25 and make the second offense \$50 instead of \$100, was defeated. The bill unamended passed 29 to 15.

The following bills passed final reading: Put Beaufort county under Statewide primary law; repeal law for Lincoln and Catawba counties; provide prison board in Madison county; prevent depredations by domestic animals in Madison county; tax dogs in Camden county; amend the Rowan county dog law; protect minors; give lodging-house keepers liens on baggage for bills; allow educational, charitable and penal institutions not under the control of the State to amend their charters (a bill made necessary for the constitutional amendments); authorize the auditor of Buncombe county to employ an assistant.

Senator Holderness directed attention to a pending bill provided for assigning fifty convicts to the Hiawasse Railroad and this provision did not appear in the caption.

Everett—Erect Confederate memorial in Raleigh; Bunn (by request)—Repeal chapter 512, Laws of 1915, relative to stock law in Duplin county. It would have Duplin revert to free range.

Justice—Repeal House Bill 281 and Senate Bill 299 relative to the Polk county jury list. This was put through immediate passage in the statement of Mr. Justice that the bill

that had been passed was a political trick of his Republican colleagues. The Senate recessed at 11 o'clock.
