NEW YORK COTTON.

New York, Feb. 2.—Cotton futures opened steady. March 15.17 to 15.06; May 15.26 to 15.07; July 15.10 to 15.07; October 14.52 to 14.56; December 14.65.

While there were several set-backs during the morning, the general trend from the interior stating that spot buyers were trying to trade. Toward noon the strongest months were five points over yesterday's close.

NEW ORLEANS COTTON.

New Orleans, Feb. 2.—Cotton opened irregular. Opening bid: March, 14.35; May, 14.51; July, 14.57; Octo-

ber, 14.69; December, 14.28 asked.
A nervous feeling was shown in the early trading in cotton in this market today. Around the opening prices lost 19 to 26 points, but this was followed by a recovery which, at the end of the first half hour of business, amounted to 14 to 20 points, leaving the most active months at a net loss of 5 to 8 points.

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The market weakened in the afternoon under small mill takings for the week and a rumor that an American ship had been sunk by a German submarine followed by a rumor that all Americans had been ordered out of Germany. At 1:30 the trading months were 50 to 90 points under the last prices of yesterday.

STOCKS.
New York, Feb. 2.—Gains and losses were so evenly divided at the opening of today's market as to suggest a conflict of opinion among traders. The uncertainty in the situation between Washington and Berlin was the cause of further caution on the part of the prospective buyers and the short interest hesitated to press their advantage. Nevertheless some important stocks at Atlantic Gulf and West Indies, Crucible Steel, Baldwin Locomotive and Erie made new low records for the current movement. United States Steel fluctuated narrowly, but beet sugar, American Locomotive, Utah Copper, Reading, Lehigh Valley and Northern Pacific were firm. The market became more irregular later on the heaviness of Steel.

Prices sagged again early in the afternoon mainly in consequence of heaviness in standard rails. St. Paul, Union Pacific, Reading, Northern Pacific and New York Central were 1 to 2 points down, and Steel, Marines, Smelting and Republic Iron forfeited all gains.

Chicago, Feb. 2.—After a cautious start, the wheat market today influenced by limited purchasing scored moderate advance. Some of the more venturesome traders took to the bull side on the ground that the absence of any rupture, yet gave hope that a break with Germany might yet be averted. Extreme cold endangering the domestic winter crops tended also to lift prices. Opening quotations, which ranged from 1 1-4 decline to 2 1-2 advance, was with May at 1.63 and July at 1.42 to 1.43 1-2, and were followed with slight downturns in some cases and then a hardening of values all around.
