NIGHT BROUGHT A DIFFERENT OPINION

(By Associated Press.)
Washington, Feb. 16.—Prohibition advocates in the Senate, after a night's reflection on Senator Reed's amendment to the postal bill, making it a crime to mail liquor into dry States, feared that it might have a reactionary effect on the prohibition movement and sought unsuccessfully to reverse the action of yesterday.

Senator Kenyon, of Iowa, one of the prohibition leaders, moved to strike the amendment from the bill. He said he was not ready for the Federal government to take drastic action at this time, and felt it should be left to

the market at today's opening. Initial quotations were mainly at fractional advances, but these soon were extended to a point or more in some of the popular issues, including United States Steel. Sugars, metals, Central Leather and other equipments and specialties also manifested underlying strength. Shipping hardened only a trifle and rails moved within narrow limits.

The market was more animated during the mid-session, gains in shipings and copper, extending to oils and other specialties. Steel and rails also rose moderately with sugars and some of the better known equipments.

Reports that marine war risks to Great Britain were easier and followed by a rally in the cotton market during the early afternoon on covering and a little fresh buying for long account. May sold up to 15.94, or within two points of last night's closing figures.

Chicago, Feb. 16.—Wheat fell off today on account of gloomy views of the export situation. Word that Canadian wheat was arriving at Minneapolis tended to offset news that arrangements had been made to move some of the domestic stock there to eastern states. Opening prices which ranged from 3 1/4, decline to 1 1/8 advance, with May at 1.74 1/4 to 1.75 and July at 1.48 3/4 to 1.49 1/2, were followed by material setbacks all around.

Barish sentiment prevailed in the corn crowd owing to the downward tendency of wheat. Rallies failed to last. After opening unchanged to 1-8c lower the market underwent a general ease.

Oats dropped with the other cereals. Commission houses led the selling. Provisions eased off on account of weakness in the hog market.
