FACTS ABOUT THE ARMY

Washington, D. C., Feb. 17.—Much has been said and written, since the beginning of the present crisis, as to the army and navy of the United States. Not since the war with Spain have all things military come in for such a large share of public attention.

Regiment, Artillery—Six batteries Brigade, Infantry—Three regiments of infantry, commanded by brigadier general.

Division, Infantry—Three brigades of infantry, one brigade artillery, one regiment of cavalry, one regiment of engineers, one signal battalion, one aero squadron, one ammunition train, one supply train, one engineer train and one hospital train, commanded by a major general.

Field Army—Two or more army corps, commanded by a general. Regiments of the several arms of the service are organized as follows: Officers Men, Peace Men, war

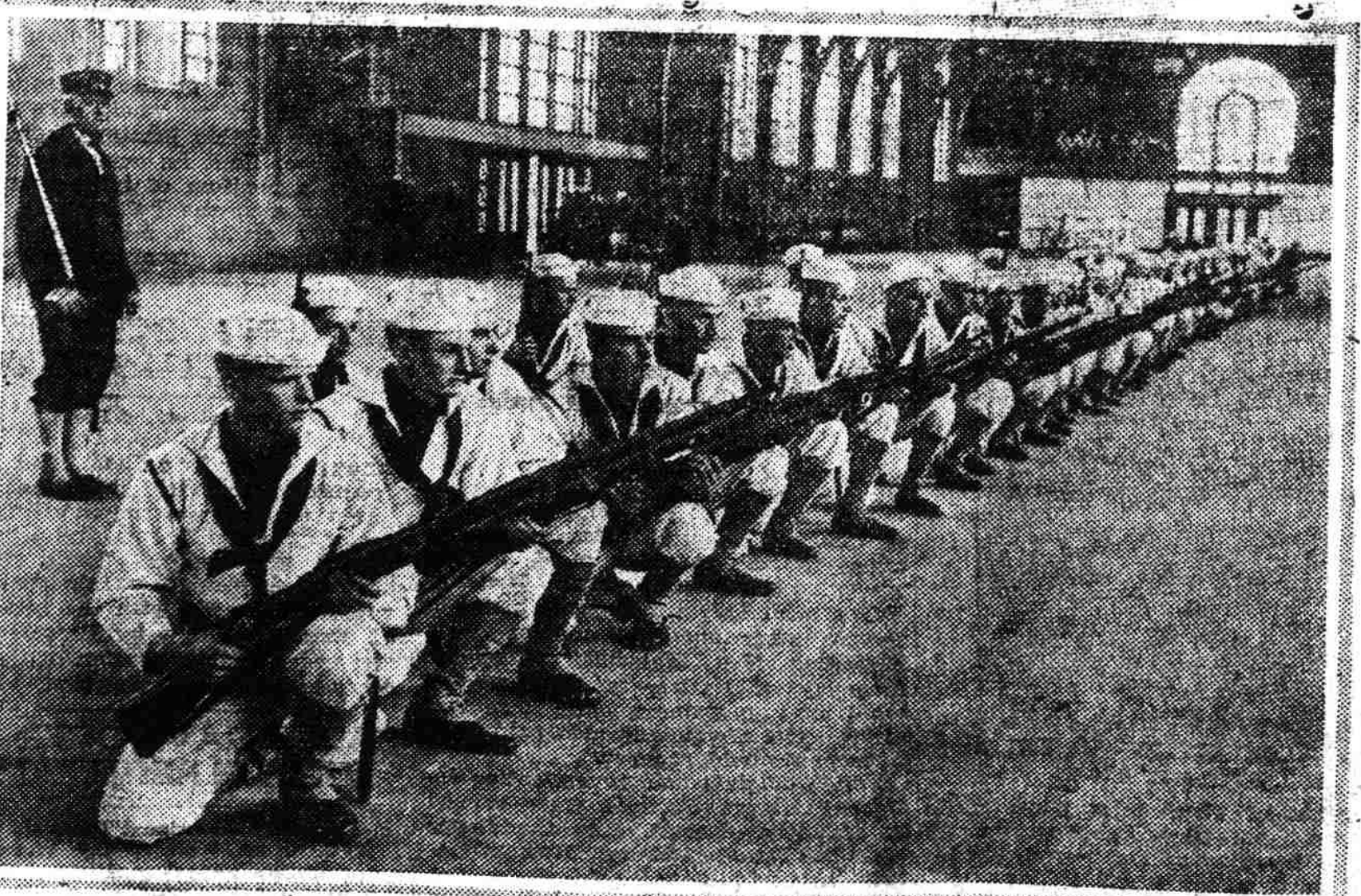
