BRITISH SMASHING HINDENBURG LINE BY HEAVY DRIVE

(Continued from Page One.)

burg line southeast of Arras has been taken, as shown by last night's official communication giving a total width of three and one-half miles to the turning movement at the top of this famous position.

In falling back the Germans are making in the direction of an emergency auxiliary line to the rear of the Hindenburg line, called the Drocourt-Queant line. Work on this position is far from complete and the Germans seem to have had no idea of using it except as a last resort. They are now fighting under orders to delay the British advance at every possible point to permit completion of the work of making the new position defensible.

On retiring from the Somme last month the Germans apparently expected to hold all the Hindenburg line running southeast from Arras in front of Cambrai and through St. Quentin and Laon. The important point at the northern end of this line was Vimy ridge. There is no doubt the Germans never expected to be driven off that ridge by a frontal attack, as was done by the Canadians on Monday.

Anticipating a northern offensive, however, the possible outflanking of the Vimy positions, the Drocourt-Queant switch running north from the Hindenburg line, was planned.

In the meantime the Germans, driven back from their old positions, were endeavoring to dig themselves in at various places, especially in front of Monchy-Le-Preux, in which process they suffered heavy casualties from artillery and machine gun fire.

It is rather difficult to explain the exact situation where the attacks center on arbitrary German field positions rather than on towns or villages. But in modern warfare, the taking of a bit of trench or a strong point marked only on war maps may be of far greater importance and significance than the capture of a city.

INJURED MAN SON SOUTHPORT CITIZEN.

Southport, N. C., April 13.—Young Joseph Miller, injured in an explosion in the government arsenal at Frankfort, a suburb of Philadelphia, yesterday, is a son of Mr. and Mrs. L. Miller, of Southport, who left yesterday to be at their son's bedside.

Young Miller, who is about 19 years of age, has been residing in Philadelphia for about a year.

In the first account carried by The Dispatch yesterday Miller was reported dead. A later press report, however, reported he was still alive, though badly injured.

WELL KNOWN CITIZEN DIES AT SOUTHPORT.

Southport, N. C., April 13.—Mr. B. F. Greer, one of Southport's oldest and one of its leading citizens, died this morning at 11 o'clock. Mr. Greer had for years conducted a meat market here and was highly esteemed. He was 71 years of age and a Confederate veteran.

He had been married twice. From the union of his first marriage three sons, Captains Frank and George Greer, of Southport, and Captain Z. B. Greer, of Savannah, and one sister, Mrs. Emma Lehw, of Southport, survive. He is also survived by his second wife and little daughter, Miss Addie Mae Greer.

GOVT. TAKES STEPS TO PROTECT ITS LONG COAST LINE.

"No permission will be granted to other than a public vessel of the United States to cross a defensive sea area between sunset and sunrise, nor during the prevalence of weather conditions that render navigation difficult or dangerous. A vessel arriving off a defensive sea area after sunset shall anchor or lie-to at a distance of at least a mile outside its limits until the following sunrise. Vessels discovered near the limits of the area at night may be fired upon.

No vessel shall be permitted to proceed within the limits of a defensive sea area at a greater speed than five knots per hour.

"All matters pertaining to fishery and the passage of small crafts within a defensive sea area shall be regulated by the senior officer of the harbor entrance patrol.

"These regulations are subject to modification by the senior officer of the harbor entrance patrol when the public interest may require, and such notification as circumstances may permit will be issued regarding modifications thus made.

"Any master of a vessel or other person within the vicinity of a defensive sea area who shall violate these regulations, or shall fail to observe an order to stop or heave-to or shall perform any act threatening the safety of navigation or shall take any action inimical to the interests of the United States in its prosecution of war, may be detained here-in by force of arms and renders himself liable to prosecution."

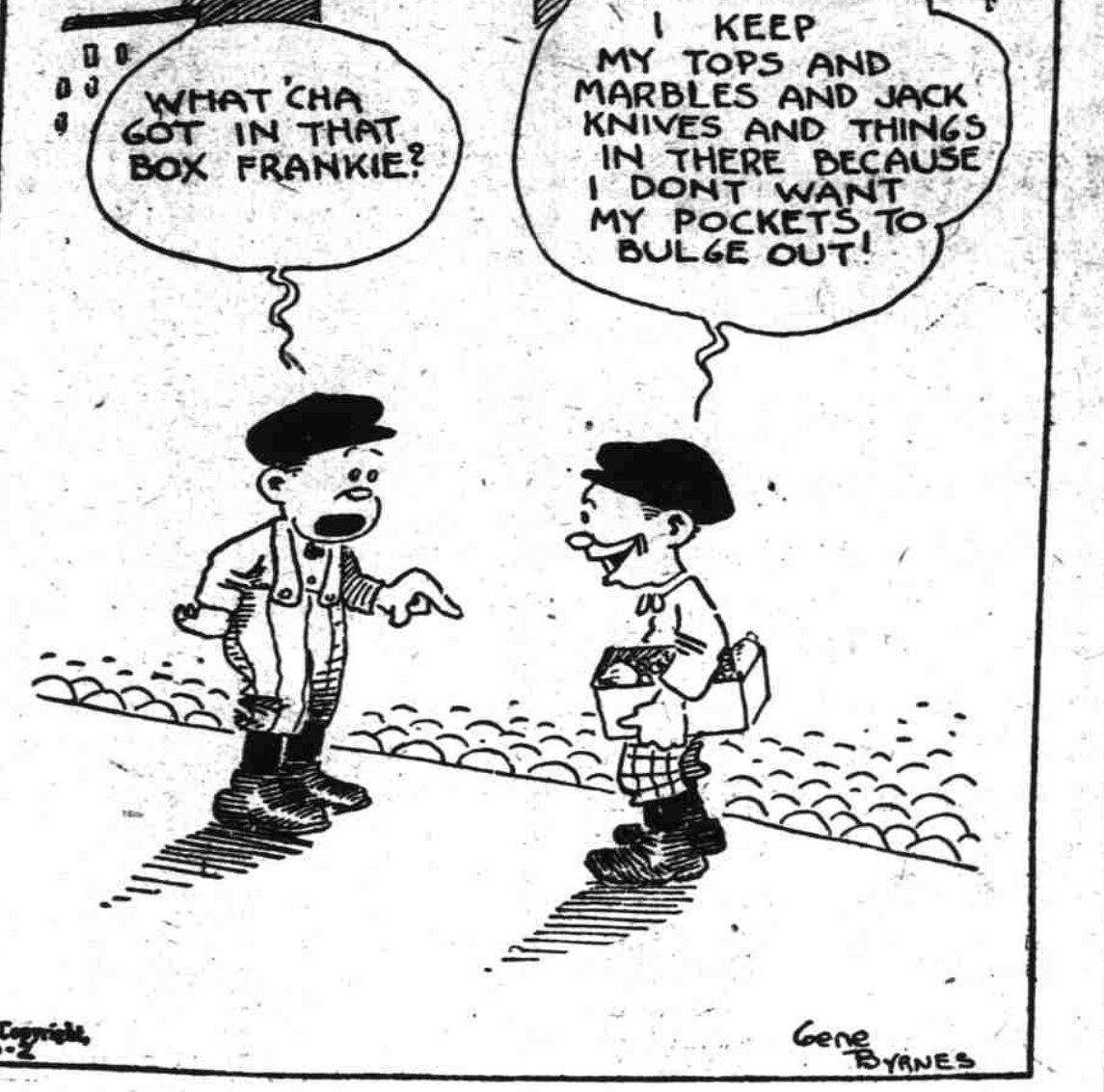

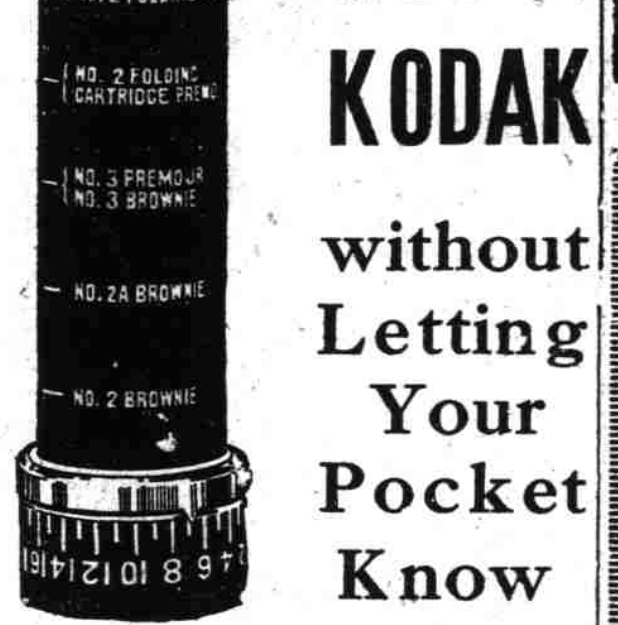
