

### ITALIANS DELAY THEIR VISIT

#### Prince Udine and Marconi Ill—State Department Makes Statement

(By Associated Press.) Washington, June 4.—The trip of the Italian war mission through the South and Middle West, which was to have begun today, has been postponed, owing to the illness of Prince Udine, and Signor William Marconi.

The Prince was taken with a slight fever today after all arrangements for the special train and for receptions in various cities had been completed. It was not felt possible for him to leave here at 1 o'clock as planned and the trip was therefore postponed until the nature of his illness became known it is believed to be not serious.

The mission has had a very busy time since its arrival here, with formal dinners and receptions every evening and important conferences and addresses during the day time. The extreme efforts by the Prince during his visit are known to have tired him much.

Mr. Marconi has been ill for the last week with a rather chronic sickness and had planned to avoid the long journey through the South with the hope of being able to join the mission at Chicago or New York.

The State Department issued the following statement:

"Owing to the sudden and severe illness of the Prince of Udine the proposed trip of the royal Italian commission to the South has been temporarily canceled. His royal highness became indisposed yesterday, and this morning had a temperature of 104. The Department of State will make further announcement concerning the tour as soon as the condition of his royal highness permits."

### MET DEATH UNDER WHEELS OF CAR

#### R. M. Wharton Killed in Tragical Manner in Union Station at Raleigh Today

(Special to The Dispatch.) Raleigh, N. C., June 4.—R. M. Wharton, a passenger on an early eastbound Southern train, was killed at 4:30 o'clock this morning while the train was backing out of the Union station shed.

Wharton left the train while it stood under the shed and appeared going toward the lunch counter. Reverting to the cars, it seems that he made no effort to catch the steps, but crawled under the car. The wheels coming along shoved him some distance, then ground him horribly. He was going from Greensboro to Goldsboro.

Mr. Wharton bore evidence of being a man of affairs, but it is impossible to determine whether he lived in Greensboro or Goldsboro, reports saying he lived at both places.

R. J. Kershaw, an Atlantic Coast Line employe, was the only eyewitness to the passenger's strange conduct in going under the train.

### MANY PROTESTS ON RATE QUESTION

Washington, June 4.—Protests of a dozen industries, ranging from non-alcoholic beverages to gasoline, were presented to the Interstate Commerce Commission today in the shipper's fight against the 15 per cent freight increase asked by the railroads. Among the interests represented were cement, coal, potash, rubber tires, live stock, grain and lumber.

### MILITARY PARADE WILL BE FEATURE

#### Every Unit in The City Will Be In Registration Day Procession

A distinctly patriotic feature of the Registration Day tomorrow will be a big military parade over the main streets of the city between 12 and 1 o'clock. In line will be every military organization of the city, headed by the crack Wilmington Drum and Bugle Corps. On account of the occasion the display of military in the streets will be of unusual significance. In the procession will be the Wilmington Light Infantry, in command of Capt. Jas. B. Lynch; Company H, Second Infantry, in command of Captain Hobbs; Troop C, Cavalry, in command of Capt. Thomas J. Gause; and the First Division, North Carolina Naval Reserve, in command of Lieut. Henry B. Peschau. This will be the first appearance of the sailors in formation since the unit was formed here on declaration of war.

All of the units will form at the armory of the W. L. I. promptly at noon tomorrow and, headed by the drum corps, will move over the downtown streets promptly thereafter. The line of march has not yet been decided upon, but it will likely be down Market to Third, on Third to Red Cross, on Red Cross to Front, on Front to Market, on Market to the armory.

Captain Lynch, of the Light Infantry, has ordered the members of his command to report at the armory at 12 o'clock tomorrow to take part in the parade.

### BAPTIST MISSION BOARD TO MEET

#### Will hold Forth Wednesday in Richmond to Outline Work for Next Year

(By Associated Press.) Richmond, Va., June 4.—The Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist convention will meet in Richmond Wednesday morning to outline work for the next year, it was announced here today. By special committee report at the recent meeting of the Southern Baptist convention the sum of \$734,000 was made available for this work, although the entire amount may not be appropriated. The foreign missionary propaganda of the Southern Baptist churches last year was based upon an expenditure of \$616,750.

An important matter before the board will be the question of entering Chile. It is probable the Southern convention will send regularly delegated missionaries there. Also, the question of operations in Russia will be considered, but as to what will be done in this matter is in doubt at the present time, owing to the chaotic conditions prevailing in that country. The Southern Baptist churches now have 307 foreign missionaries at work, aided by 800 native helpers.

### AMERICAN COTTON FOR GERMANY

#### That Country Supplied With Large Amount Through Italian Ports

(By Associated Press.) Boston, June 4.—Germany has been supplied with American cotton through Italian trader according to a report of an investigating committee of the National Association of Cotton Manufacturers, which was made public last night. The report advocates government control of shipments of cotton and its products from this country, adding that "could such a step have been taken three years ago it would have materially lessened the length of the war."

"No shipments of raw cotton are being made to Denmark," the report says, "but during the eight months ended in February of the present year, there were shipped to the Netherlands, Norway, Sweden and Italy 349,736,349 pounds of raw cotton. The greater part of these shipments went to the port of Genoa in Italy. The latter country has never formally declared war against Germany and there are good reasons for the belief that, through its traders, large amounts of cotton have found their way to the central powers. The shipments to Genoa, including Naples, for the 31 weeks ended March 2, of the present year, were 502,462 bales, compared to a total approximating less than half that amount during the same period in 1914. Nor do these figures include the exports of cotton waste which is used to a very large extent in the manufacture of explosives."

"While Italy has been fighting with the Allies all the time, governed by the foregoing figures, the total shipments for the 31 weeks ended March 2 are to say the least, startling."

### THE KEET CHILD STILL MISSING

#### The Police Working On A New, But Shadowy, Clue

(By Associated Press.) Springfield, Mo., June 4.—Four days' absence from his home, from which he so mysteriously disappeared last Wednesday night, has not shaken the faith of the mother that Lloyd Keet, 14-months-old son of J. H. Keet, wealthy banker of this city, will be returned safely.

Police today were working on another clue, furnished by a neighbor, Mrs. S. E. Palmer, who lives directly opposite the Keet residence. Mrs. Palmer stated that on the night the baby disappeared she saw three men lurking in the shadows surrounding the Keet home shortly after the departure of the parents for the dance at a country club.

Mrs. Palmer's young daughter, Gladys, substantiated this statement, but said the night was so dark that the forms she saw were mere shadows.

### AMERICAN NOTE RECEIVED IN RUSSIA

(By Associated Press.) Washington, June 4.—President Wilson's communication to the new Russian government on the war aims of the United States has been delivered at Petrograd by Ambassador Francis, but will not be published in this country or in Russia for a day or two, while the State Department is clearing up what are officially characterized as "matters of detail."

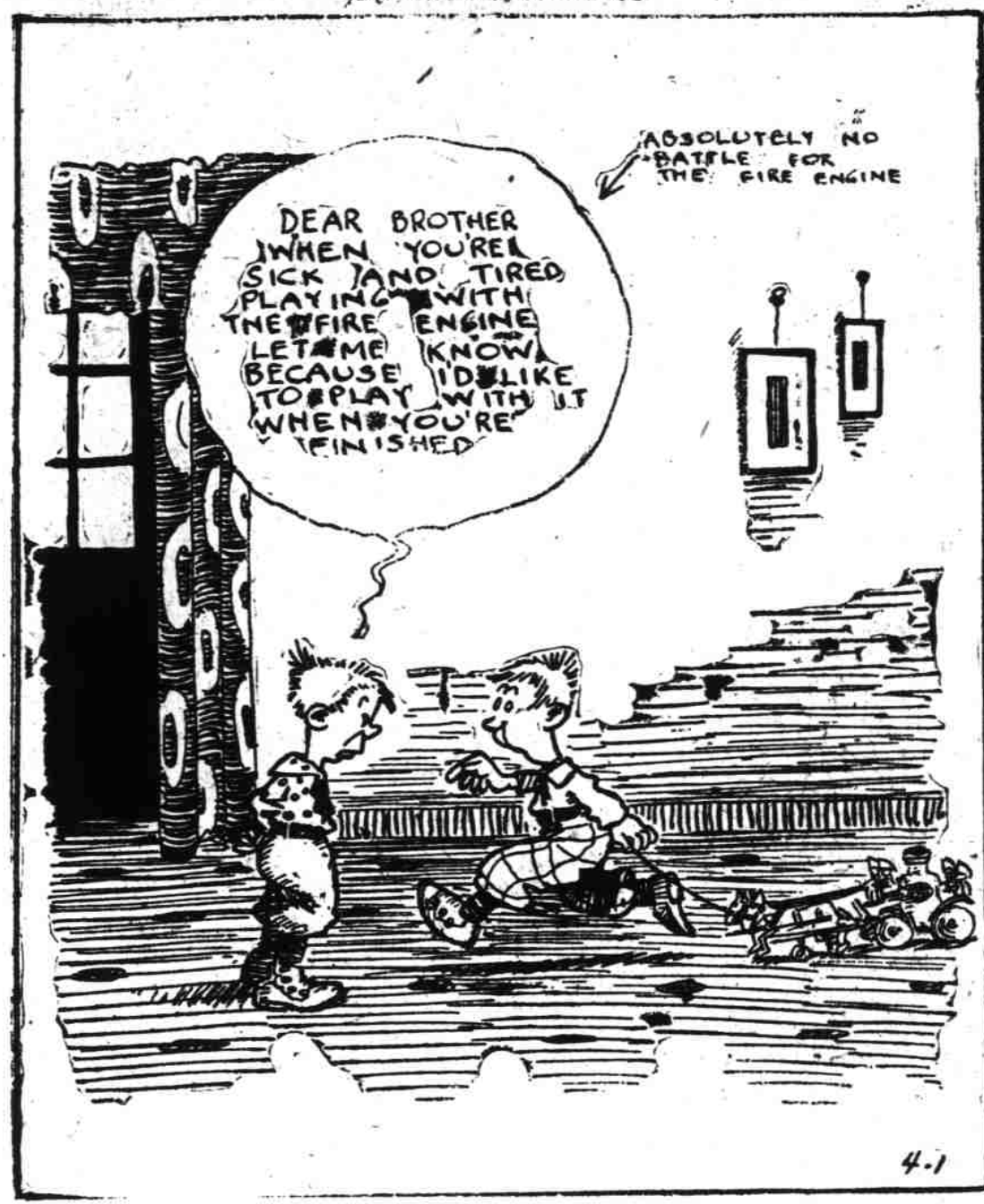
