# PREACHERS PROBE PERILS PROFESSIONAL EVANGELISTS

Careful Study by Sympathetic Pastors Discovers Glaring Evils in System—Billy Sunday Mends Methods—Success of Spectacular Evangelist in New York is Raising Up a Crop of Imitators—The Church Speaks Up.

Billy Sunday's spectacular work in New York is bringing to a focus the whole question of professional evangelists in the churches; their use and their methods, and their relationship to the established agencies of Christianity. Concerning Billy himself, there is substantial agreement among churchmen. They are for him. He is the great guerrilla of Christianity. He pioneers the way through the indifference of the unchurched public, and, in the colloquial phrase, puts religion on the map.

But the imitators of Billy Sunday have become a serious problem for the churches. The number of these is legion. Professional evangelism has suddenly become a very attractive field for a host of men who are lured by the steady grind of the pastorate. Cities too are tempted to find a short cut out of all their problems by hiring an outsider to do their work for them by high pressure methods.

The methods of Mr. Sunday are not exclusively his own. He himself got them from evangelist Williams, and practically all other evangelists have now adopted his plans. It may be said, as a generalization, that the methods of all evangelists are now substantially alike, both with respect to finances and to religious operations. Billy himself has gone ahead of the little fellows and has greatly modified his financial plans, to the delight of the church people. He has abolished the receiving of presents from the platform, and many of the other objectionable features that are now being criticized on the part of his imitators.

Preachers Put in the Probe. Opportunely, and without any relation to New York, the Ministerial Association of Wilmington, Delaware, has, one year after a social evangelist campaign of this kind, conducted an investigation into the whole question among the churches and pastors of the city. Every minister, regardless of denomination, was asked to answer a series of questions upon the effects of the campaign, and requested to give his mature judgment upon the evangelist's methods. It happened that this particular evangelist had conducted what was looked upon as a successful series of meetings, and the pastors were friendly to him.

Now the results of this investigation have been published in The Continent. It is to be noted that the criticisms come, not from the outside, but from the pastors who, with their churches, had done the work and paid the bills and reaped the results. They have a spiritual responsibility for the field, and nobody could question their perfect right to the fullest and most searching investigation.

Out of thirty-seven pastors who cooperated actively in the campaign, twenty-four made written answers to the committee of the Ministerial Association. The others, the committee says, while not reporting in writing, were believed to be in substantial agreement with all the conclusions.

Leaving the Preachers Out. The first criticism of importance was the unanimous one that the evangelist went ahead on his own hook without consulting the preachers. Profers of well-meant advance were rejected as disloyalty. The practical suggestion is offered that regular conferences between the evangelist and the pastors are indispensable to the success of any united evangelistic campaign.

"With one exception all the pastors heard from object to the policy of carrying on personal work in the midst of the meetings through 'great numbers of promiscuous and untrained workers.' Their conviction is that under such a method the 'real and ultimate reason for accepting Christ is lost in the confusion of personal considerations, overwrought emotions, inadequate presentation of the word, selfish and denominational arguments, mass movements and other kindred appeals.' Fewer workers more carefully trained, these pastors believe, will bring about more profitable results.

The Graft and the Grotesque. "The difficulty of instructing children and securing from them intelligent action in a great tabernacle campaign" is, in the opinion of the Wilmington pastors, so evident that they are by great majority persuaded that it would be better not to try to influence children at all in connection with such movements.

"Yelling, applauding, original songs," and the platform presentation of gifts to the evangelist and similar sensationalism, are more sharply condemned than any other aspect of the tabernacle services. Devotional spirit, it is declared, breaks down utterly under such a handicap.

"Clearer discrimination in the evangelist's invitations is insisted upon. All the classes urged to decision ought to be included in a tabernacle effort, but they ought to be so sharply distinguished that Christians, active and pious, shall not be made to stultify themselves as prodigals and backslid-

ers. "That the finance methods of evangelists need revision is common opinion of all the pastors, but they do not agree as to what amendment is most desirable. Two-thirds prefer a stipulated salary for the evangelist for the period of the campaign, relieving him from the temptation to 'pad returns' in order to stimulate contributions. The other third think the present method of a freewill offering for the evangelist would be satisfactory if the offerings were 'strictly' freewill. All take exception to efforts by members of the evangelist's party to promote the evangelist's remuneration.

Keeping Churches Open. "Two-thirds of the pastors likewise subscribe to the opinion that the worship of local churches in their own buildings ought not to be completely interrupted during the progress of a campaign. They would have regular church services in the morning each Sabbath, and union services at the tabernacle in the evening.

"No gain for civic righteousness or stimulus to community conscience is recognized by Wilmington's ministry, unless in some slight strengthening of sentiment for temperance. But even this appears conjectural to most of those responding to the committee.

Snobbery of Society "Stunts." "Again there is a division of sentiment on the value of parlor meetings in prominent homes; only two in three of answering pastors believe that the possibility of reaching the masses was jeopardized by undemocratic social meetings among the wealthy." Others, however, justify the practice by analogy with shop meetings for workmen.

"A lack of comprehensiveness in the evangelist's message is deplored. The evangelist was felt to be 'hitting hard those things that it is easiest to hit hard' while omitting to deal with subtler and perhaps farther reaching sins. The effects of the revival are felt on the whole to have been greater among the wealthy and the poor than among the middle classes."

General ecclesiastical bodies and the Federal Council of Churches are all aiming now to bring the professional evangelist under some sort of control. Evangelists themselves have organized an association in the hope of imposing restraint upon the men who range too far afield. The new mood of efficiency in the churches will certainly utilize the evangelist, but also hold him steadily to the main issue, and bring him to account for all violations of the code of the churches.
