New York, June 22.—The cotton market was very quiet early today with fluctuations irregular. The opening was two points lower to nine points higher with October selling at 25 1/2 and December at 25 3/8 after the call, or within a point of last night's closing figures.

YOUNG WOMAN COMMITS MURDER

Waukesha, Wis., June 22.—Miss Grace Lusk, high school teacher, who yesterday shot and killed Mrs. Robert's wife of Dr. David Roberts, former State veterinarian, and then tried to kill herself by sending two bullets into her body, probably will recover, physicians said today.

Dr. R. E. Davies, and Chief of Police McKay, Miss Lusk said: "I am sorry for Mrs. Roberts. I hope my wounds are fatal. I never thought I could do it. I loved Dr. Roberts and want him now and always."
